Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance attach photo

This one-story building is situated near a busy thoroughfare in a park-like grassy area that slopes gently upward from the street. It is a brick structure with terra cotta trim, including a dentilled cornice, frieze and large quoins. Fenestration consists of large multipaned casement windows under arched transoms with decorative terra cotta keystones. The building has a gable roof of slate, with parapets extending upward at the gable ends. One eye-catching feature is the beautiful vents on the gable ends, but the most impressive feature is the beautiful design used for the windows. These plus the red brick and the classical elements make this building identifiably Georgian.

#### a. History

(A general history of the Seattle Public Library and its buildings follows the inventory form for the West Seattle Branch.)

The Columbia Branch opened in 1909 in the main room of the building that had served as town hall before Columbia City was annexed to Seattle two years earlier. In 1911 the Carnegie Corporation offered \$70,000 for two more branch libraries in Seattle. The land for a branch in the Columbia neighborhood was purchased with \$2,500 contributed by citizens and \$2,000 of city money. This cleared the way for construction to begin, and the building opened in December 1915. It continues to serve its original purpose.

### b. Evaluation of Significance

This building is a well-preserved example of a Carnegie Library and has been an important focus for the intellectual and social life of the neighborhood it serves. The architects are both well known locally. The historic importance of this building was recognized by placement of it on the National Register as a structure of pivotal importance to the Columbia City Historic District.
