Beginning at A thence SE 200 ft to B, thence N. W. to lane and along lane to C at Fall Lick Road, thence NE with road 110 ft to D, thence SE 400 ft to A, containing the stone house and log barn. Other minor and later outbuildings are scattered in farm yard.  $\approx 1 \frac{2}{3}$  acre
