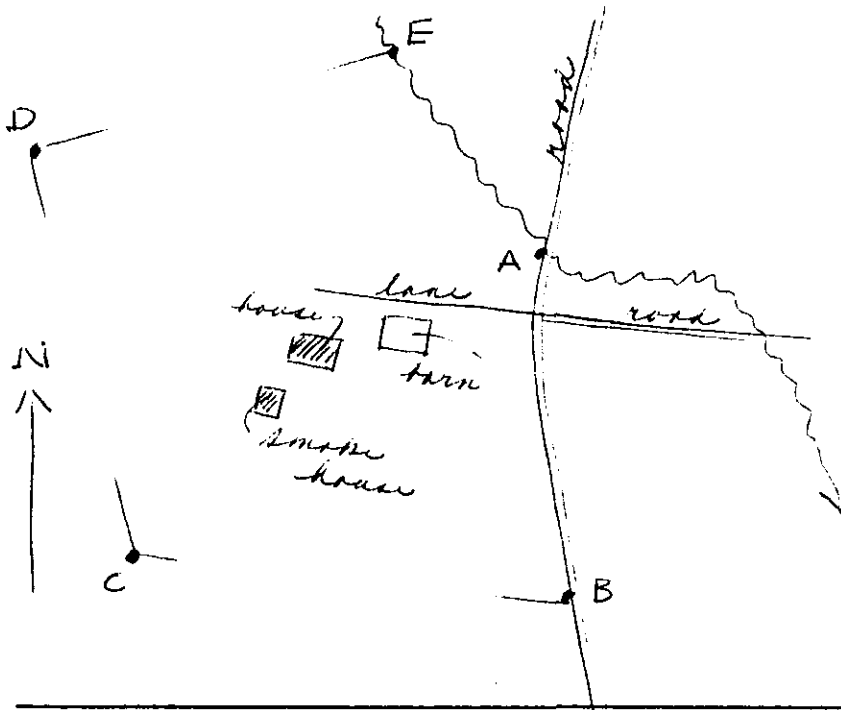

45. Description and House Plan:

One-story, three-bay, center-passage, dry-stone house, Upper Ordovician limestone of mixed color—some gray, some golden. Excellent quality masonry, well bonded, stones squared and coursed, original mortar steeple pointed (some concrete repointing). Exterior chimneys each gable end; square attic windows (now closed in). Exterior frames are covered with boards and front slope of roof was raised to make more headroom upstairs around the turn of century.

House is of singular dimensions—ca. 20 x 50 feet; center passage is very wide—one-third of house. All rooms have been sheathed with box-car siding of Victorian Age, but east room retains original mantel and chair rail. Very fine mantel—5' 2" tall x 6' 10" wide, has fluting, dentils and pinwheel center block.
