The Nolynn Baptist Church is a one-story, three bay, rectangular plan, gable front church built in 1895 in the Victorian Romanesque style. The church is located to the west of Hodgenville in a rural section of the county. The church is oriented towards the south and faces KY Highway 222. On three sides of the church is a large cemetery.

The church has a stone foundation, gable roof of asphalt shingles, and exterior of six-course common bond brick. The main (S) facade has the primary entrance which consists of two original double doors of raised four panel design. Above the doors is an arched transom with stained glass lights and the arch is composed of several rows of brick relief arching. The entrance is set within a large recessed brick arch. Flanking the entrance bay are large blind recessed Romanesque arches. These arches continue on the east and west facades and each bay contains an original one-over-one arched window with stained glass.

To the rear of the church is a ca. 1970 one-story frame addition. The interior was inaccessible but church members state that the original open layout remains along with most original woodwork.

To the south, east, and west of the church is a large cemetery which contains approximately 200 graves and monuments.

## PROPERTY TYPE: Religious Buildings

The Nolynn Baptist Church is significant under criterion C for its architectural design and under Criteria Consideration D, a cemetery which contains the county's oldest and most significant graves.\* The church was organized in 1803 and the cemetery contains the graves of Larue County's most prominent early settlers and their families such as William Larue and Robert Hodgen who were instrumental in the settlement and formation of Larue County and Hodgenville. The significance of this cemetery extends to ca. 1830 when the last of these prominent settlers were buried. The present church was constructed in 1895. It is a fine example of the Victorian Romanesque style and retains its original design and detailing. As an architecturally significant church, the resource meets Criteria Consideration A.

The Nolynn Baptist Church was organized in 1803 and originally occupied a log church at this location. The church was one of the primary churches in the county in the early 19th century and was attended by the prominent Larue and Hodgen families. William Larue and Robert Hodgen were two of the most important individuals who settled the county and both were buried in the church cemetery upon their deaths. The original log church was later replaced by a brick church and this church stood until it was destroyed by fire in 1893.

Over the next two years the congregation raised money to build the present church. A total of \$3,000 was contributed by members and in July of 1895 the present church was dedicated. This church was built in the Victorian Romanesque style and has large arched bays on the main facades as well as corbelled brickwork.

The Nolynn Baptist Church is the county's only example of a 19th century Romanesque style church and it retains its original design and detailing. The cemetery is also included as a contributing site as the resting place for the Larue and Hodgen families who were instrumental in the creation and settlement of the county.

\*Robert Hodgen was buried in the cemetery in 1810, which marks the first burial for the site. Based on this fact, the beginning of the Period of Significance of the cemetery is 1810. As stated above, the end of the Period of Significance is ca. 1830. No other sites are known to be extant with an association with Hodgen or Larue.

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


