The Ludington House was built in two sections, the front part in 1860 and the back in 1872. It is a red brick structure with light-colored stone quoining at all outside corners of

the original 1860 section.

The roofline varies in height from one to three stories with both round and square towers being employed. It is further complicated by the seven brick chimneys serving the ten fire-places in the house.

Two balconies extend from the east facade; these are the only horizontal projections from the very vertical wall design. No lines tend to carry the eye around at any given level.

Most openings for windows and doors are rectangular with stone lintels and sills. The exceptions are the arched window and door lintels of the square tower and the round windows in the gable ends of the 1860 section.

To the rear a large rambling wooden porch protects the first floor and terminates in a porte-cochere.

With its cherry woodwork, gold leaf moldings, embossed leather wainscoting, and ten fireplaces, it is regarded as the most splendid of the early houses of Lawrence.

Since the present owners acquired the Ludington House in 1959, they have restored the house to its nineteenth century appearance.

The Ludington House was designed in 1860 by John G. Haskell, one of Kansas' best known early architects. It was commissioned by Reuben W. Ludington, an important businessman and civic leader in Lawrence.

Judge Solon O. Thacher, who had been chairman of the 1859 Wyandotte convention which wrote the Kansas constitution, acquired ownership in 1869. Following Thacher's appointment by Pres. Chester A. Arthur in 1872 as "Ambassador to Central and South America and Mexico," the house was remodeled extensively and the entire back half with its round tower and portecochere was added.

The Ludington House is an excellent building by one of the earliest prominent Kansas architects, John G. Haskell. The house incorporates a variety of influences including Romanesque arches in the tower, English Manor House chimneys, and Renaissance window pediments.
