
--eared and corbelled gable end parapets; flush eaves on both sides with wooden fascia board

--wide main entry, occupying the two middle bays, is fitted with a modern overhead garage door; above it the original opening is framed in and spanned with a steel I-beam.

--secondary entry in north end bay has a stone sill, molded surround and a modern panel door

--a painted sign, now badly faded, on the north wall advertised, "Glanville & Gaston" and a carpentry furniture repair business.
