DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present structure commonly known as Forbes Mill is actually the two story stone storage annex which was added to the original four story stone mill building in the fall of 1880. The original "Santa Rosa" Flour Mill building torn down between 1915 and 1929 was constructed in 1852-'54. W.H. Rogers, Dr. W.S. McMurtry and Dr. McMurtry's son, George, constructed the extant annex building. George S. McMurty, fifteen years old in 1880, used a horse and sled to haul stone for the annex from a quarry in Los Gatos Canyon. This quarry was possibly the same site from which the "Santa Rosa" Flour Mill's green quartzitic sandstone blocks were quarried.

Most extant pictures of the Mill feature the Annex rather prominently. The east, west and north walls date from November 1880. The Annex's south wall is composed of approximately the first two stories of the original north wall of the "Santa Rosa" Flour Mill. There are two buttresses, one at each end of the original remaining walls. These remnants of the original east and west walls were left to support the old section which became the south wall of the new annex. CONTINUATION SHEET

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The "Annex" and the mill proper were mostly vacant from 1887, when flourmilling suspended, to 1912, the year of purchase by the P.G. & E. The original 50'X 60', locally quarried stone mill building was first de-roofed, then taken down to the first story in 1915. The remainder of the first story and south wall were razed in 1929, excepting, of course, the two-story section of the original north wall included in the extant structure.

The P.G. & E. installed a thick, two-foot concrete partition about 8 to 10 feet from the east end of the annex. They cut a 4×7 foot opening at ground level, over which was installed a heavy sliding door. Three ceramic tile ducts were in were installed above this door, near the roof, for transmission lines. The room so-formed was to house electric power transformers.

P.G. & E. sold the property in 1955 and moved their facility to the other side of the new Highway 17 freeway being built. The next use for the annex was ca. 1961-62, as a Naval Museum by Admiral Lockwood, a WW II submarine commander. The building leaked and money and public interest were lacking, so the project failed. Next, youth groups were allowed to use the building with a minimum of change until the problem of earthquake vulnerability was raised to end that use (1971-72).

At the present time, much of the interior wood construction has been destroyed due to lack of surveillance and private ownership on somewhat secluded vacant land.

All land encompassed within the boundaries of this application are lands originally owned by the Los Gatos Manufacturing Company in 1892 upon which the mill and annex were sited. The original property has been reduced to the present configuration because of encroachments by development and freeway construction.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Forbes Mill Annex was constructed in November 1880 as an addition to the "Santa Rosa" Flour Mill built by James Alexander Forbes in 1852-'54. Forbes, a well-educated Scotchman who had come to California in 1831 by way of South America, was active as a tutor at the Mission Santa Clara; as British vice-consul to Alta California, 1842-'47, at Monterey and San Francisco; Hudson Bay Company sub factor and later as a factor at San Francisco. He was also resident manager of the New Almaden Quicksilver Mines in the early period of their exploitation by the Barron-Forbes Company of Tepic, Mexico, 1847-'48. By 1852 Santa Clara County had become a predominately wheat-producing area, and Forbes took advantage of the perenially abun ant waters of the Los Gatos Creek to supply the power to run his mill which by 1881 was distributing flour nationwide.

W.H. Rogers purchased the Forbes Mill'in 1866, and the Annex which he added in 1880 is today the only tangible remains of the original Forbes Mill. Forbes' "Santa Rosa" Flour Mill and its Annex became the nucleus for the beginnings of the present town of Los Gatos. The town was first referred to as "Forbes Mill" and later as "Forbestown". In early townsite subdivision mapping and planning, the "Old Stone Mill" area was considered to be the geographical center of town.

Architecturally, the Annex is significant as the last remaining rough-hewn local quartzitic sandstone block structure in Los Gatos, and 19th century stone flour mill building in Santa Clara County. The original mill was torn down between 1915 and 1929. Historically, it provides the only tangible link to Los Gaots' beginnings, having served originally as a storage facility for the Forbes Mill; and subsequently as an ice storage facility, P.G. & E. sub station, and in recent years as a youth center.
