This property is listed in the National Register of Historic Places in accordance with the attached nomination documentation subject to the following exceptions, exclusions, or amendments, notwithstanding the National Park Service certification included in the nomination documentation.

Amended Items in Nomination:

This property was architecturally significant based on the fact that the Jaaska House is one of the best intact examples of a cross-gable vernacular house built with cedar plank contruction within the local context area. However, architecture was not indicated as an area of significance as it should have been. Following a telephone conversation with Leonard Garfield of the Washington SHPO office, it was determined that architecture should appropriately be included as an area of significance. As a result, beginning the period of significance in 1888 (the approximate date of the house's construction) is an acceptable reflection of the property's architectural significance.

In the opinion of the surveyor, this property is located in a potential historic district (National and/or local).

The Jaaska House and Warehouse are historically significant for their association with the Finnish logging town of Independence. The buildings are the last structures closely associated with the community of immigrants located at the junction of the Milwaukee and Oregon-Washington Navigation Company railroads in southwestern Thurston County. In addition, the Jaaska House is one of the best intact examples of a cross-gable vernacular house built with cedar plank construction.

Most of the early settlers in the area were of Swedish and Finnish descent who had come to the area seeking jobs in

Most of the early settlers in the area were of Swedish and Finnish descent who had come to the area seeking jobs in the lumber industry. The junction of the two lines was called "Helsing Junction" for their native Helsinki, Finland. On July 4, 1906, railroad tracks from Centralia and Hoquiam met at this spot and railroad workers renamed it "Independence." In 1908, a third railroad line came through, opening up the valley for logging firms and spur lines along the tracks. The community boasted a section house, depot, Finnish Lutheran Church, post office, meeting hall, and mercantile. Alex Jaaska, a native of Finland, purchased the nominated property in 1903. The house was constructed c. 1888 by R.M. Faton. Jaaska built a store across the road from the house in Helsing Junction in 1911 and constructed the storage building on the property. In 1914, the Ninemier-Morgan Mill was started at Helsing, bringing an influx of population and trade for Jaaska's store. Other small mills and portable facilities also located in the valley as did farming and dairying. With the decline in the lumber industry, population moved elsewhere. By the 1970s, the church, mercantile, depot, and section house were torn down, as was Jaaska's store.

Description of Physical Appearance

The Jaaska House and storage building are located in the Independence Valley near the Chehalis River, southwest of Rochester in sparsely populated southeast Thurston County. The main road originally ran in front of the house instead of its present location to the south. The house is a rectangular one and one-half story wood plank structure on a stone foundation. The gable roof is covered with wood shingles while the walls are clad with drop siding and cornerboards. Vertical boards skirt the foundation. Fenestration consists of tall narrow single and paired double-hung sash with oneover-one lights. The northeast corner features a rectangular one story bay with hooded roof, double-hung sash, and a panelled apron. A porch, recessed under the southeast corner of the roof, shelters the main entry door and an auxiliary door. The porch has turned posts with sawn brackets. The metal pipe railings and concrete steps leading to the entry are later additions.

The north end of the house has a shed-roofed porch running the width of the house which shelters two entry doors. The porch has plain posts and a wooden porch and steps. Adjoining the house on the south is a rectangular garage/outbuilding of later vintage. The building is clad in clapboard and has a gable roof with large doors on the south side and smaller windows punctuating the sides. A multi-paned glass enclosed porch is on the west side of the house adjoining the garage and main house.

The storage building is a rectangular wood frame structure with a tall central monitor gable roof flanked by lower shed-roofed sections. The roofs are shingled with exposed rafters and bracketed eaves. The south gable end has the main entry doors facing the road. Rows of small four-paned windows light the second story on the west and east (continued)

facades. The north wall and part of the east wall on the first story are constructed of railroad ties. The house is nearly unaltered from the original with intact woodwork, floors, and walls. No modernization for a bathroom and little in the kitchen has been done. The house has recently been stripped down and is slated to undergo renovation. The storage building has had the floors replaced due to dry rot.
