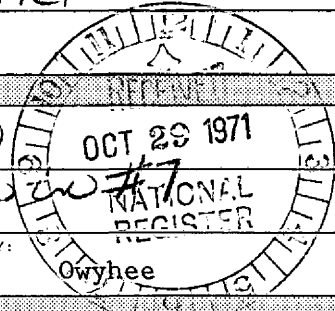

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This historic district includes the closely related old towns of Silver City, Ruby City, Boonsville, Dewey, and Fairview along with major silver mines on War Eagle Mountain and Florida Mountain. A placer mining stretch of upper Jordan creek also is included, along with the ends of the Reynold's creek, Jordan creek, and Scotch Bob roads to the mines.

About forty buildings, including the early-day Idaho Hotel, remain at Silver; some are maintained, and others are falling into disrepair. The ghost town atmosphere has not been ruined by modernization, and excellent opportunities exist for interpretation of a mining community in the mines as well as in the town. The town has a number of residences, some old commercial buildings, lodge buildings, and a school and church. Traces of early placer mining are limited, but dumps, mill sites, tunnels, shafts, and an exposed quartz vein (about the best example to be found anywhere) may still be seen. Part of the Cumberland mill (built too late for use) survives. Foundations of other mills are visible.

This area includes sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of T5S, R3W; sections 31-32 of T4S, R3W; sections 25, 26, 35, and 36 of T4S, R4W; and sections 1, 2, and 12 of T5S, R4W. In a major district such as this, the mines extend over considerable area. The workings of the Trade Dollar Consolidated along include a system of interconnected tunnels in Florida Mountain which connect Silver City and Dewey, more than two miles apart.

This historic district needs to be interpreted as an area, and because it is remote from settlement, it can be preserved without difficulty. BLM, the agency which owns the land, agrees that this whole area should be protected.

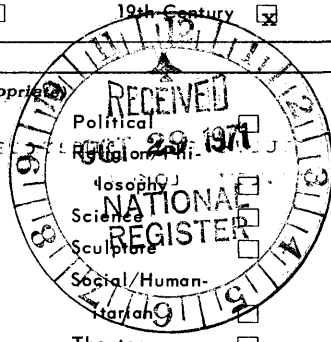

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Boise Basin gold discoveries in 1862 brought mining to the Owyhee region the next year. Coming from the new town of Placerville, Michael Jordan's party of 29 prospectors found gold on Jordan Creek, May 18, 1863; after working up the stream a few days, they returned to Boise Basin with news that set off the Owyhee gold rush. Quartz discoveries in July and August, particularly the rich Orofino high on War Eagle Mountain, augmented the easily worked placers. Not until another important lode, The Morning Star, was located October 14, 1863, did it begin to become apparent that the Owyhee mines would be noted primarily for silver. By the fall of 1864, ore from the Orofino and the Morning Star began to keep a number of different stamp mills busy producing a million dollars a year. Then in September, 1864, incredibly rich ore turned up in another magnificent War Eagle property called, somewhat imaginatively, the Poorman. A claim war stopped work on the Poorman after a production of only six days, but in those six days, surface operations by the hastiest methods yielded over \$500,000 worth of ore. Litigation over title to the Poorman was finally compromised; in the summer of 1866, serious efforts began on that property. Fabulously spectacular Poorman ore specimens were displayed in Congress and in the Paris International Exposition, where the Poorman exhibit received a special gold medal in 1867. Additional major lode discoveries on War Eagle Mountain led to a full-scale underground claim war early in 1868. Hostilities were suppressed, and the mines went on producing until the failure of the Bank of California, August 26, 1875, brought most work to a halt. The community did not collapse even then although Silver City's daily newspaper (The Owyhee Avalanche had started August 19, 1865, and had become Idaho's earliest daily after telegraph service reached Silver City, August 31, 1875) eventually had to become a weekly again.

Most of Silver City's \$40,000,000 mineral yield came from lower grade properties in Florida Mountain, which could be developed because of improved transportation available after the Oregon Short Line commenced transcontinental rail service in 1884. Most of the buildings go back to this later era, less spectacular but more productive than the early years. After the big companies shut down in 1912, Silver City continued as county seat until a 1934 referendum moved the county government to Murphy. After wartime restrictions terminated mining in 1947, Silver City became an authentic ghost town.
