Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Robinson-Parsons Farm of South Paris, Maine, completed in 1803, is a large and well-preserved example of the Federal style in a rural residential context.

The $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story house faces east and is of frame construction with brick end-walls (rare in Maine), four internal brick end-chimneys, gabled roof, and field-stone foundation. The clapboarded facade is five bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance consists of a single panelled door surmounted by a fan-light and flanked by Doric pilasters. Above the fan-light is an entablatured lintel. Fenestration on the facade, as elsewhere, is 6/6.

There are secondary entrances in each of the 3-bay ends of the building.

Extending westward from the rear wall of the house is a two-story frame ell with entrances facing north and south. This ell is long (five bays) and connects the house with a large gable-roofed barn with shingled siding.

The interior features on the second floor feature a hinged wall making possible the creation of a large room for social occasions and dancing.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This fine example of rural Federal architecture is located on land originally acquired in 1788 by Stephen Robinson, one of the first settlers in this part of Paris. A small house, which now serves as the ell for the 1803 dwelling, served as the family home until five daughters had arrived. This necessitated construction of the large brickended house with its delicately designed central doorway.

Eventually five more daughters and one son arrived so that it is little wonder that a hinge partition was installed between two large second floor bedrooms to provide room for dancing and other social events.

One of the daughters married John Parsons, an early settler of Norway, Maine, and farm passed into that family in whose hands it remains being one of very few houses of that age to stay in the ownership of consecutive descendents of the builder.
