Significance (cont.)

It remained in the Major family until 1903. In the 1920s it was used as a tea room and tavern, called the Blue Lantern, a name which has been retained. In form, the house is relatively simple, consisting of a cross-plan two-storied main block with flanking one storied wings. The wings and the center of the main block project forward and are connected by extensions of the hipped roofs of the wings. The main entries to the central passage of the house are at the sides of the central bay--under the covered walkways of the facade. The windows are segmentally arched and placed in pairs across the main facade. The Italianate inspiration is found in the low hipped roof, the bracketed cornices, the tower-like central projection and in the lack of a central entrance. Originally, the corners of the brick structure were painted white in imitation of stone quoins.
