Begun for Isaac Flick, the house was completed after his death by his sons and daughters as their residence. The house passed briefly to C. R. Kite before comin to the current owner. Oral history indicates Isaac Flick wished to erect a more impressive house than the William B. Rogers house, also in Bellevue and one of the few other Queen Anne style houses in Boone County (see Be-358).

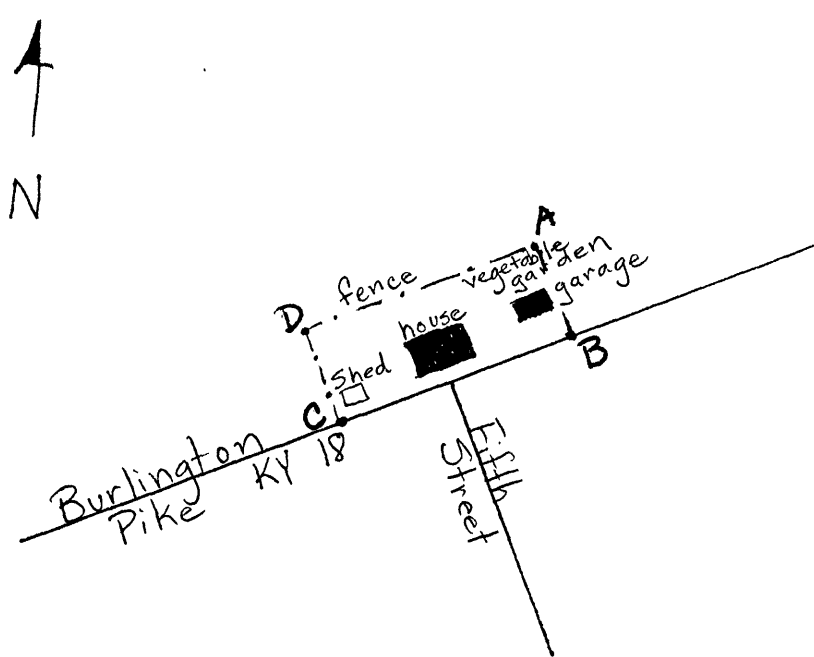

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):

Beginning at a point (C) on the north side of Burlington Pike (Ky 18) and 100' southwest of Fifth Street, proceed northwest 200' (D). Then proceed northeast 250' (A), turning southeast for 200' to the north side of Burlington Pike (B). Then proceed southwest along Burlington Pike 250' to the point of origin. The boundary includes the house, outbuildings, and contiguous field and garden. The much larger tract behind the house and historically associated with it has lost integrity and is now used as a gravel pit.

45. Description and House Plan:

In form, the house consists of pyramidal-roofed block with projecting gables on all four faces. The gables are filled with three shapes of decorative shingles, diamond windows with colored glass and gable-peaks set with colored tile. The L-shaped front porch is supported with stock columns; the wheel-chair ramp is a temporary structure at the center of the porch. The iron cresting on the roof is original, but the eaves and cornice have been replaced with aluminum versions due to rotting. The double-hung sash windows are topped with simple cornice strips.

The interior is an irregular arrangement of rooms, three deep, with a side passage-stairhall. The detailing is largely intact, consisting of stock classically inspired woodwork for the most part. The staircase is particularly rich, as are the columned double-mantels with mirrors and, around the coal grates, colored tile. The kitchen is finished with tongue-in-groove wainscoting and an egg-and-dart rail.

Minor alterations include adding a bathroom in the angle of the projecting gable at the northwest of the house and the enclosing of the recess between the stairhall and the kitchen pantry. A barn constructed about the same time as the house was removed approximately 20 years ago. The garage, a frame outbuilding built at about the same time as the house, contributes to the historical qualities of the site. The structure is a wood post and wire mesh fence that appears to date prior to 1938. The site also includes a modern shed constructed after the period of significance.

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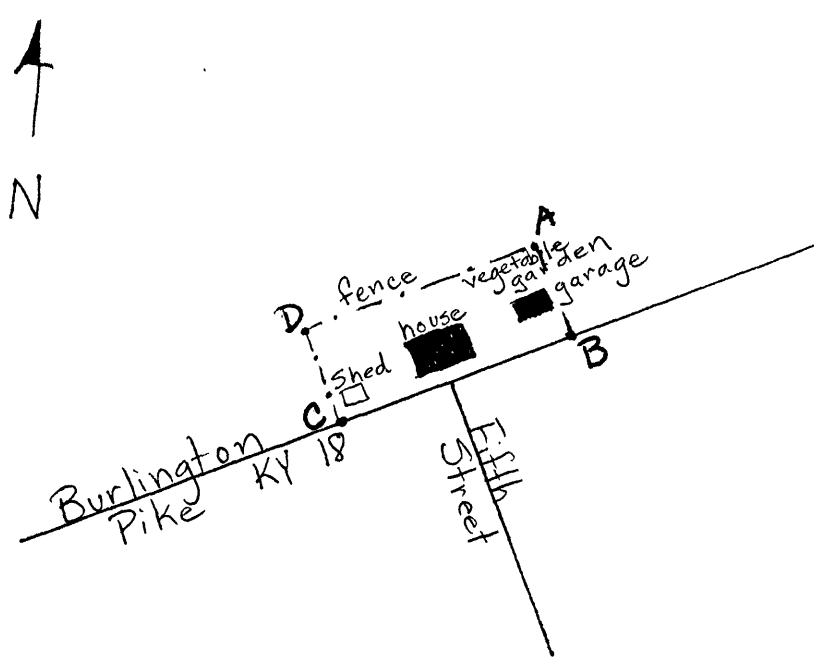
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
