## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Stearns house is a 2½ story frame residence on a rock-faced stone foundation. Overall dimensions are 44' x 54'. The main roof is a high hip, with an assortment of gabled projections and small, jerkin-head dormers. A principal feature is the very large, semicircular bay on the north side, with a bell-shaped roof and a first story constructed of rock-faced stone. Exterior surfaces exhibit a variety of textures and patterns: narrow clapboarding, scalloped shingling, and patterned slate on the roof. Curved "strapwork" appears in the large gable ends on east and west sides. On the north side, what would have been one long porch across the entire facade is broken into two segments by the protruding semicircular bay. (This front porch originally ended, at the east side, in a portecochere, with gable roof perpendicular to the main porch roof). The front porch repeats the denticular cornice of the main roof, and is supported by short Ionic columns on high stone pedestals. There is a small, second-story recessed porch on the northeast corner, with panneled posts and spindle "frieze"; and much simpler, recessed porches on the southeast and southwest corners, sheltering rear entrances. Windows are for the most part 1/1 sash in simple frame surrounds; the small windows in dormers and gable ends have small, diamond-shaped lights, and there is some stained glass. There are two tall brick chimneys with corbelled caps. Finials and portions of the roof cresting are extant, but the balustrade on the main roof deck has been replaced.

The main entrance (on the northeast corner) opens into a large living hall running parallel to the front of the house. All principal rooms open onto this hall. Walls are mostly plastered, floors are oak, some with patterned inlay. Woodwork (including four sets of sliding doors) and much interior hardware is intact.

South and slightly east of the house is a carriage house, which is contemporary with the main structure. It is formed by the intersection of two hipped-roof masses set at right angles to one another, one long and narrow, the other short and somewhat taller. These masses are enlivened by wall dormers with gable roofs. The exterior of this structure is finished with narrow clapboarding on the ground story, and scalloped shingling above. There are four sliding doors on the north side, hung from a metal rail, and panelled with boards set in a herringbone pattern.

The Stearns house is located on a large corner lot on the main street of this small (pop. 275) rural community. It has recently been repainted a buff color, with light brown trim.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Stearns house in Garden Grove is a nice example of the vernacular expression of American Queen Anne residential architecture popular among Iowa's small-town "prominent citizens" toward the end of the 19th century. Distinguishing features include the irregular plan around a large living hall, cluttered roofscape, and variety of surface textures (shingling, clapboards, "strapwork" and rock-faced stone). The tall chimneys, with their decorative brickwork, and the semicircular bay that dominates the front facade, are also noteworthy. The carriage house, whose exterior treatment is similar to that of the house itself, serves as a good "companion piece".

The house is believed to have been built for C.S. Stearns about 1885. Stearns was a local merchant and banker whose uncles, A.B. and Dan Stearn, were early settlers and entrepreneurs in Garden Grove. Among C.S. Stearns' activities were C.S. Stearns & Bros., a mercantile establishment begun in 1883, and the First National Bank, est. 1900.
