

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The John G. Bush House is located at the corner of Center and Pearl streets, a short distance from the commercial center of the community of Dover. It is an orange brick Italianate structure, almost square in plan, with hipped roof and bracketed eves. A one story summer kitchen extends to the north (rear), and bays extend to the east and west. A porch of uncertain construction date extends across the south side (front) terminating in an octagon projection at the southwest corner. Fenestration consists primarily of two-over-two double-hung sash in segmental arch openings with white hoods. The house has a stone foundation while the porch is supported by concrete block piers with segmental arch openings between them. A garage which extends north from the summer kitchen is the only modern intrusion. The interior remains largely intact although there has been some remodeling.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The John G. Bush House is significant as a well-preserved representative example of residential Italianate architectural design in a rural Olmsted County community. It was built about 1880 by John G. Bush who began as a prosperous area farmer and later became a Dover merchant, investing in a drug store which still stands in the community. Dover had been platted on the Winona and St. Peter Railroad in 1869, and was undergoing a prosperous development period about the time Bush constructed his house. The house has been well-maintained by subsequent owners.
