Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The William D. Parry house is included in the "Historic Resources of Marble, Colorado, and Vicinity" multiple property listing under the historic context of "Settlement and Development of the Town of Marble, Colorado, 1881-1917." Because the William D. Parry House and its associated secondary structures were (1) privately constructed within the 1881-1917 period of significance, and (2) reflect their original design, workmanship, materials, and setting, they meet the registration requirements of the "Private Residences of Marble, Colorado" property type.

Typical of the lots in the town of Marble, the Parry house is on a heavily-forested site; the landscaping is natural vegetation. The building faces Main Street. The town's commercial center was originally located one block east of the house, but nearly all the commercial buildings are gone. At the end of the block, to the east, is the Marble City State Bank. There are nine buildings on the property: The Parry House and eight contributing outbuildings.

The William D. Parry house is a front-gabled, one-and-a-half story, vernacular, wood frame building. The building has a center, paneled, front door with a transom, flanked by narrow double-hung windows with simple wooden surrounds. The front gable end has decorative wood shingles and a small, square window. The vergeboard on the front gable end is decorated with vertical wooden slats. The full-width, front, shed porch has chamfered post supports, a stickwork balustrade, a wooden porch floor, a porch frieze with wooden slats, and a small triangular-shaped pediment above the center bay.

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The building has board and batten siding. Most of the wood is unpainted, although the front of the building has been painted white with green trim, the colors of the Colorado-Yule Marble Company. The side elevations have four over four windows with simple wood surrounds. The building has a corrugated metal roof, with the remains of a brick chimney. A shed addition is located in the rear.

Eight secondary structures are located behind the Parry house. Winifred VanOver, the granddaughter of William Parry, recalled that her grandfather and father never wanted any of their machinery exposed to the elements so they built numerous sheds on the property. The main house and secondary structures are connected by wooden sidewalks. Some of the secondary structures have stone foundations; others have no foundation.

Following is a list of the William D. Parry secondary structures. The numbers are keyed to the sketch map which accompanies this nomination:

- 1) A front-gabled outbuilding, with board and batten and vertical plank siding. This building is shown on the 1914 Sanborn map as a residence.
- 2) A shed with vertical board siding and a corrugated metal roof.
- 3) A false front building with board and batten siding attached to a dilapidated log structure. This building served as the home of William Parry, after his son married and lived with his wife and family in the main house.
- 4) A log shed, in deteriorated condition.
- 5) A privy with vertical board siding.
- 6) A partially collapsed shed with vertical board siding used as a garage.
- 7) A garage with vertical board siding, barn doors, and a metal roof.
- 8) A privy with vertical board siding.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The William D. Parry house was built in 1891 by one of the pioneers of Marble, Colorado. In 1881, William D. Parry, together with William Wood, founded the town of Marble which, by the early twentieth century, had become the center of one of the most significant marble quarrying regions in the United States. Because it is associated with the founding and settlement of Marble, the William D. Parry House is eligible to the National Register of Historic Places under criterion A. Because it is a rare and well-preserved representation of the town's settlement-era architecture, the Parry House is also eligible to the National Register under criterion C. The Parry house is included in the "Historic Resources of Marble, Colorado, and Vicinity," multiple property listing under the historic context of "Settlement and Development of the Town of Marble, 1881-1917." The house meets the registration requirements of the "Private Residences of Marble, Colorado" property type.

William Parry was born 10 May 1856 in Wales, where, as a boy, he worked as a carpenter. At the age of sixteen, Parry emigrated to the United States, settling in Boston. In 1879, he came to Cripple Creek, and later worked as a miner in the mining towns of Leadville, Georgetown, Schofield, and Gothic, Colorado.

In 1881, W. F. Mason and John Mobley founded the town of Clarence at the junction of Carbonate Creek and Yule Creek in the Crystal River Valley. At

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approximately the same time, William Woods and William Parry, who had been prospecting for precious metals in the area, plotted the town of Marble immediately west of Clarence. On 1 October 1885, Parry, together with John McKay and G. D. Griffith, located two 1500 by three hundred foot marble lode claims on the west side of Yule Creek. These two claims, the London and the New Discovery--along with the Blue Marble and the White Marble claims which were located in July, 1886, by Parry, McKay, Griffith, and A. A. Johnson--soon became the center of marble operations on Yule Creek.

In the spring of 1887, Parry married Mary Elizabeth Foulkes, a native of Liverpool, England. Parry had met Foulkes during a trip to Wales, and they were married in New York. Although Parry had founded Marble, he and his wife originally lived in a cabin he built near the Penny Hot Springs close to Redstone, Colorado. The Parry's only child, Wilfred C. Parry, was born in 1888.

In 1891, the Parrys moved to Marble, at which time William Parry built this house at 115 Main Street. Elizabeth Parry died in 1917. After his son Wilfred Parry married Minnie Crist, William Parry moved into one of the secondary buildings on the property, leaving the family house to his son. The false-fronted secondary building in which William Parry lived until his death in 1917, is still standing behind the main house. Wilfred and Minnie Parry lived in the house until Wilfred's death in 1950. In 1952, the home was purchased by Mary and Paul Ganley.

The William Parry House has retained a high degree of architectural integrity, and is an excellent representation of the town's settlement-era architecture. Like many of the town's historic private residences, the William Parry House is a front-gabled, vernacular wood frame building with simple ornamentation. The building has a center door, flanked by narrow double-hung windows with simple wooden surrounds. The front gable end has decorative wood shingles, and a vergeboard decorated with vertical wooden slats. The front porch has chamfered post supports, a stickwork balustrade, a porch frieze with wooden slats, and a small triangular-shaped pediment above the center bay.


