Description

The John G. Whittier School was constructed in 1929. It was designed by local architects Lescher & Mahoney. The building is constructed in the Second Renaissance Revival architectural style and represents the Custom Architecturally Designed Schoolhouse property type. The school retains integrity of its design including stylistic elements, plan configuration and massing. It also retains integrity of construction materials and building details. It has a compatible one-story, brick addition extending from the rear at the north end of the original building. The John G. Whittier School has been in continuous us a as a school from 1929 to the present day.

The John G. Whittier School faces east onto North 16th Street. The site is characterized by a grass yard with mature trees at the front and by asphalt and concrete surfaces at the rear. The school yard is surrounded by wrought iron fence. No outbuildings are located on the site.

The John G. Whittier School is a symmetrical, two-story building of brick construction. The walls are sheathed with brick and concrete. The rectangular structure measures 150 x 60 feet. The hip roof features gabled ventilator dormers and is covered with rolled asphalt. It has a concrete foundation.

Exterior features include a three part facade centered about a slightly projecting frontispiece. Design elements of that central bay include a rusticated cast stone veneer, central entry with cast stone architrave, and a band of five windows on the second story set in a colonade and framed with quoins. The brickwork at the principal facade is distinguished by a diamond shaped tapestry pattern. A cast stone comice band extends along the facade at window sill height and is broken only by two tabernacle frames containing cast stone busts of Abraham Lincoln and George Washington.

A ca. 1940 single story wing is located at the north end of the west, or rear, facade. It is of brick construction with a gable roof with a veranda on the south wall. An extension of that wing, also constructed of brick, was built in the 1970s.

Statement of Significance

The John G. Whittier School is significant under Criteria A in the area of significance of Education. Built in 1929, the John G. Whittier School is associated with the first large increase in enrollment and the corresponding boom in school construction in Phoenix School District #1 in the 1920s and therefore represents the historic context "Education in Phoenix, 1871-1942." The John G. Whittier School is an excellent illustration of its property type, the Custom Architecturally Designed Schoolhouse. The building possesses the important characteristics of the property type specifically the combination of standardized functional criteria with a mainstream, highly articulated architectural style to form one unified architectural statement.

Between 1920 and 1930 Phoenix's population expanded from 29,053 in 1920 to 48,118 in 1930. A direct result of this increase in population was a corresponding increase in school age children. In Phoenix School District #1, for example, enrollment increased 22% between the 1920 and 1921 school year and 13% between the 1924 and 1925 school year.

As early as 1920 it became apparent to Phoenix School District #1 officials that existing school facilities could not accommodate the increased enrollment. In response to this situation, Phoenix School District #1 voters passed four separate bond issues between 1920 and 1930 totaling more than 1.4 million dollars. This money was to be used to expand existing schools and construct new schools. Built in 1929, the John G. Whittier School represents a school constructed by Phoenix School District #1 during this period of expansion. It served the children of the new residential neighborhoods of east central Phoenix.

The John G. Whittier School is a good representation of the Custom Architecturally Designed Schoolhouse property type. The School exemplifies the early twentieth century movement toward specialized design and spatial organization of school buildings, including multiple classrooms accessed by central corridors along the building's horizontal axis, and specialized rooms for libraries, and teaching and administrative offices. The Whittier School also illustrates the most common stylistic treatment for building's of this property type that were built after 1920. The building represents a freely interpreted version of the Second Renaissance Revival style with elements drawn from a variety of Italian modes.

Elements of the Second Renaissance Revival architectural style as represented in the John G. Whittier School include the central frontispiece with cast stone block design, the Italian entrance architrave, the second story colonade, the window arrangement giving the impression of a balcony, the tapestry brick, and the cast stone busts.
