

Description:

The David Sherman House in Woodbury is a 2 ½ story clapboarded dwelling with an integral lean-to across the back, giving the house a "saltbox" profile (Photographs 1 and 2). The house dates from about 1760. A large brick chimney emerges near the center of the wood-shingled gable roof, which has its ridge line set parallel to the road. However, the house is not completely symmetrical; there are two windows to the left of the main entry on the east elevation and but one window for the smaller room on the north side of the chimney. Windows have simple board frames and are fitted with 12-over 12 sash on the first floor and 12-over-8 on the second. The entry appears to have been remodeled in the early 19th century; it features fluted pilasters and a cornice with widely spaced dentils and breaks above the pilasters (Photograph 3). Extending from the back of the house is a 1 ½-story ell with its own large brick chimney. The ell is believed to have been built about 1817 to accommodate hat makers who worked in the shop of then-owner John Brush.

The setting for the house varies greatly depending on whether it is viewed from the front (east) side or from the rear. Middle Quarter Road is a narrow country road with scattered houses from the 18th and 19th centuries; it continues Old Sherman Hill Road, the road from Middlebury and Lake Quassapaug traversed by the French. The rear of the property, however, faces State Route 67 in a heavily developed commercial area. The house shares its lot with a restaurant fronting on Route 67. The boundary of the nominated property includes only the house, not the restaurant or its parking area.

Significance:

The David Sherman House is significant for its associations with an important event in Connecticut's Colonial-period military history, the march of French forces under the command of Count Rochambeau on the way to the Revolution's final battle at Yorktown, Virginia (Criterion A). One aspect of the event that had an effect on both the French and their American hosts were the many social interactions between the two groups that occurred as the French made their way across the state. According to a tradition recorded in Cothren's *History of Ancient Woodbury* (1871), "in 1781 when the French troops marched through Woodbury on their way to Yorktown, David Sherman offered to those near his house 12 bushels of apples and eight barrels of cider." The French did not camp in Woodbury but instead moved on to Newtown, where they rested and regrouped. According to Cothren, Sherman continued his generosity to America's allies by hosting an evening soirée attended by French officers, who could have ridden from the camp back to this part of Woodbury in a matter of minutes: "they had a dance in which some of the damsels joined with the polite French officers, in their uniforms, while others looked on." This may well have been the last such evening for the French. In Newtown, the army assumed a much higher level of military discipline in anticipation of moving into territory closer to areas under British control, and most opportunities for socializing with the Americans ceased.

The David Sherman House retains much of its historical appearance, with appropriate clapboarded exterior, wood shingled roof, large center chimney, and small-pane divided sash. In addition to helping sustain the house's identity as an 18th-century dwelling, one that probably looks much as it did when the French officers stepped their final gavottes and gigues, these features give the house architectural significance under Criterion C, since they make it a well-preserved and restored example of the domestic architecture of Colonial Connecticut. The later rear ell and doorway have relatively little visual effect in diluting its character.

The association of the house with the entertainment of French officers can be regarded as credible for three reasons: the house certainly lies directly in the route of the French march from Middlebury to Newtown; the local tradition was written down at a relatively early date (1871), when the children of some of the participants could still have been living; and the tradition includes believable details that are not repeated (as are some stories) in other towns.

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Boundary Description:

The nominated property, part of a parcel recorded in the Woodbury Land Records in Volume 139, page 964, includes only the house at 63 Middle Quarter Road and that portion of the land that lies east of a line that parallels the rear wall of the house's ell at a distance of 25' to the west.

Boundary Justification:

The house shares its lot with a restaurant that fronts on Route 67, facing north, in a densely built commercial area; the back yard of the house adjoins the parking lot of the restaurant. By dividing the lot so as to include a buffer of 25 feet along the rear wall of the house, the nominated property's boundary will include the land immediately adjoining the historic house and exclude the restaurant and its parking.
