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7 DESCRIPTION								
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Built in 1780 by John Carter on an Indian mound in a secluded spot on the banks of the Watauga River, the Mansion, as it was commonly called, is now within the city limits of Elizabethton, and stands as a fitting memorial to a father and son who served Tennessee well in the early pioneer days. Through the glass windows, which were once the wonder of the frontier, can be seen the old family burying ground where these statesmen and many of their descendants are buried.

The house as originally built was two-story, of rectangular shape, built on a stone foundation over a basement, with a stone chimney at each end. In recent years the top portion of the chimney on the south end has been replaced by brick. Unlike most of the houses built in this area at this time, the house is of frame construction covered with clapboards instead of being built of logs. The plain front entrance is flanked by two windows to the left and one to the right, with the front elevation having four windows on the second floor level. The north elevation has two windows on each floor level, while there is only one window on each level on the south elevation.

The plain exterior of the house gives no hint of the architectural beauty of the interior. The front entrance opens into a large hall or room, 16' x 25' made entirely of pine paneling, with a ceiling height of nine feet, four inches, possessing the dignity of a hall in one of the 18th century Virginia houses along the James, and was possibly patterned after Shirley, the Virginia home of the Carters. Over the fireplace is an elaborate, curved pediment supported by fluted pilasters, both containing delicate dentil work.

Adjoining this room are two small rooms, paneled similarly, with corner fireplaces with paneled chimney breasts. From the back of the main entrance hall or room, a stairway ascends to the second floor.

The second floor has a spacious hall within which the stairs in undiminished width lead to the attic, and two bedrooms with their walls and ceilings, like those in the hall, made of pine sheathing. Some of the boards are twenty-two inches in width. The master bedchamber is 19' x 23' with a ceiling height of seven feet ten inches. Over the mantel of pre-Georgian detail is an oil painting on a large panel of wood depicting in archaic style a gloomy landscape across which a stag pursued by a dog bounds toward a church and graveyard.

Sometime prior to the Civil War a two-story ell was added to the back of the bouse, two rooms on each floor, with a porch on each Nevel running the length of the addition. One brick chimney was built in the center of the wing.

The house has been vacant for about four years and its exterior is in a deteriorating condition. The interior woodwork, however, is in amazingly good condition considering its age and the overall condition of the building. Even the painted mural has escaped obliteration by paint or wallpaper for 192 years.



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lished on the frontier in 1772 as the first free and independent community on the American continent composed of American-born freemen.

Early in 1772 the settlers, under the "Articles of the Watauga Association," elected John Carter chairman of the Court, which for several years combined the legislative, judicial, and executive functions of the infant government. Both John Carter and his son Landon acquired extensive lands in the area and were prominent in governmental as well as military affairs, having taken part in the Revolutionary War as well as Indian activities. Carter County was named in 1796 for Landon Carter, and the county seat, Elizabethton, was named for his wife.

Plans are currently well under way for the development of the Sycamore Shoals area, a Registered National Landmark in Elizabethton, the site of the Watauga settlement and the place from which the "overmountain men" from Tennessee, including John Carter, departed for the Battle of King's Mountain where they played a decisive part in the victory. It is hoped that the Carter home can be preserved and incorporated in some way into this development, thus saving one of Tennessee's earliest houses.
