Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Craig House, constructed c. 1860 and remodeled c. 1901, is located in the Catawba region of rural Lancaster County near the town of Van Wyck. The house is an excellent example of the evolution of a typical mid-nineteenth century farmhouse, modernized in the early twentieth century.

Additional Information

The residence is a two-story, originally L-shaped (additions in the ell), frame building covered in clapboard with a brick pier foundation with concrete block infill. The composition-covered roof is lateral gable with molded boxed cornice with returns and wide-board frieze with a lower gable ell. The building has a three-bay west facade with a central entry. A one-story hipped-roof porch covers the west facade and wraps around one bay on both the north and south facades. A central one-bay balcony on the west facade has a gable roof with molded boxed cornice and returns and wide-board frieze. The porch has turned posts with decorative sawn brackets and turned balusters on the second story balcony. The south end-bay of the present porch is enclosed with insect screening. photograph of the house in 1910 shows the same porch without the present The siding of the west facade under the porch and balcony have clapboard with a raised center molding. The house has chamfered corner boards, molded crossette door surrounds, molded window surrounds, and paired semi-circular arched louvered vents within a molded peak arched surround in the gable ends (the vent peak in the center gable has an inset diamond panel). The house has six-over-six, double-hung sash windows with a few windows on the rear and sides being replaced with later two-over-two light windows. A window leading onto the screened porch has been converted into a door and an adjacent single window has been replaced by a double window.

The Craig House is significant as an intact example of a mid-nineteenth century rural farmhouse with early twentieth century alterations, and is

typical of Lancaster County farmhouses from the period.

It was built c. 1860 by John Johnston Craig (1818-1866), a farmer in the Craigville community of Iancaster District. Craig enlisted in the Confederate States Army in 1863, served in Virginia with the 4th South Carolina Cavalry, and died in 1866 of illness contracted while in service. His son, John Edgar Craig (1863-1960), inherited the house and family farm, and extensively remodeled the house c. 1901. The house remains in the Craig family today.(1)

9. Major Bibliographical References

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The house has several rear additions: a turn of the century steeply pitched, two-story, clapboard, shed-roof addition in the ell; a clapboard one-story shed addition attached to the former addition; and a c. 1945 addition on the north elevation covered with asbestos. The 1910 photograph shows a kitchen wing attached to the rear of the ell which no longer exists.

There is a modern storage shed/garage located on the grounds of the nominated property.
