

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Archibald Woods House, "Woodsland," is situated in a residential setting in the Mercer County community of Harrodsburg. Originally part of a four acre tract, the one and one-half story brick house is now associated with smaller scale residential buildings built during the early 1950s.

The front elevation of the Woods House is five bays wide with a center entrance surmounted by a simple four pane transom window. Flemish bond masonry distinguishes the front and south elevations, while the remaining facades exhibit common bond walls. The windows on the front facade are fitted with fluted surrounds while those on the side and rear facades are more restrained, showing their distinctive pegged construction. All of the window bays on the front elevation are double hung 9/6, and with the exception of the dormer, exhibit jack arch lintels and wooden lugsills. The remaining elevations have 6/6 windows with both soldiercourse and jack arch lintels.

At either gable end is an end chimney flanked by garret windows. The front block has an asbestos shingle roof while the rear ell features a standing seam metal roof. Both gabled dormers have diagonal beaded board construction and appear to be contemporary to the house. The house has no cellar but rests on a rubble limestone foundation. Interestingly, the brick walls were laid considerably below the first floor joists, thus enabling vents to be built into the crawl space for circulation.

The interior features a center hall with two flanking parlors; the parlor on the south side measuring 18' square. Most of the woodwork, which includes a beaded chairrail, carved mantels, balustrade, and paneled doors, appears to be intact. Attached to the rear of the north parlor is a one-story brick ell consisting of the dining room and kitchen.

A variety of alterations, most of them minor, have been made to the house. The three chimneys were rebuilt in 1973 and the original six panel front doors were replaced with the existing three panel type. What appears to have been a porch on the south side of the ell has been enclosed. A fireplace and serving window in the kitchen were closed while portions of the chairrailing and baseboards have been removed or replaced. The linen press in the north parlor is of the period but was removed from an outbuilding that is no longer standing.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Archibald Woods House, "Woodsland," is a significant example of early nineteenth century Federal vernacular architecture in Harrodsburg, Kentucky. Built c. 1819, the 1½ story brick center hall passage residence is distinguished by its somewhat unusual massing and distinctive Federal design. Although the Bluegrass community of Harrodsburg (pop. 1980: 7,265) is widely known for its diverse collection of nineteenth century architecture, there are few houses built in the manner of Woodsland. The integrity of design and materials is largely intact, particularly through the retention of the nine-over-six windows, fluted Federal woodwork, and jack arch lintels. The front elevation does not appear to have been painted and exhibits Flemish bond masonry. Collectively these features make Woodsland a locally important and distinguishable embodiment of Federal architecture.

Archibald Woods moved to Harrods Fort from Botetourt County, Virginia, c. 1775. Until he built Woodsland, Woods and his family lived in two log houses. On December 18, 1819, Woods purchased four acres from Richard Fairman and subsequently built the $1\frac{1}{2}$ story brick dwelling nominated herein. All the materials used in building the house came from the Woods' property. The current owner's son, Lewis C. Woods, Jr., suggests that Archibald Woods was the architect for the house and that his two eldest sons built it. While Archibald Woods is also known to have operated a cording mill in Harrodsburg, its precise location has not been verified.
