7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The one and one-half story John N. Griffin House was built in 1892 by noted local carpenter-builder and architect James Ernest Ferguson in the Queen Anne/Eastlake style. It adjoins the lot on which the nominated A. W. Ferguson House stands and is the third Ferguson-built house on the block. It has sustained only minor alterations and retains a high degree of integrity.

Facing north on Grand Avenue between 16th and 17th Street, the nominated property occupies Lot 4 of Block 22, of Shively's Addition to Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon. It is further described as Tax Lot 7000, a parcel approximately 50 x 150 feet in dimension, located in the SW_4 of the SE_4 of Section 8, Township 8 North, Range 9 West of the Willamette Meridian. The house is sited on a sloping lot oriented to the north and facing the Columbia River. Access is gained through steps surrounded by a retaining wall set with rough cut, randomly placed stones.

The basically rectangular mass terminates in a shingled hipped roof from which projects gables on the north and west and east elevations. In typical fashion to the Queen Anne style, a projecting gable with lower level slanted bay dominates the north facade. This feature is primarily duplicated on the west elevation.

Two small gables provide light to the attic on the northeast and southeastern sections of the roof. An extension of the roof on the north elevation shelters the porch and connects to the bay projection on the east. Porch posts and railings are plain and non-original trellis work is used for decorative relief.

Walls are primarily sheathed in horizontal channel siding, although narrow, vertical, board and batten is found at the cornice level and in panels below most windows. Additionally, shingling and diagonal boards are evident in the projecting bays.

Windows are generally one-over-one, double-hung sash of varying sizes and widths, and are set into simple board frames. An enclosed porch on the east elevation is a later alteration as are changes to south elevation windows and door. A narrow north/south oriented outbuilding is attached to the hipped roof kitchen wing and was erected at a later date.

Decorative interest is provided by paired curved brackets under the eaves, modified Palladian-style windows in the larger northern and western gables, and turned posts which appears at the gable chamfers.

There is a basement under the house which was probably dirt-floored when the house was first built. A concrete floor and half-wall has been put in, with vertical wooden siding above that. Again, these are trimmed with horizontal boards and simple surrounds for the small three-pane windows.

The interior of the John N. Griffin House has the typical plastered walls of other Ferguson houses. Turned and fluted molding and decorations surround the doors and windows, and have been carefully restored.

The stairway up from the first to the second floor is rather steep and narrow, but the rooms upstairs are roomy and comfortable although with limited headroom because of the sloping ceilings.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The John N. Griffin House, located at 1643 Grand Avenue in Astoria, Clatsop County, Oregon, was erected in 1892. It is locally significant under Criterion "c" for its associations with local carpenter-builder and architect James Ernest Ferguson, who was responsible for the construction of many significant Astoria buildings. Additionally, the association of the house with John N. Griffin, who settled in the area in 1883 and was instrumental in establishing the weather station and telegraph service - among other accomplishments - meets Criterion "b." It was erected in the Queen Anne/Eastlake style.

John N. Griffin was born in Alexandria, Virginia in 1859 and spent his boyhood in Washington, D.C. He joined the U.S. Army Signal Corps in 1880 and was sent to the Astoria area in 1883 to help set up a weather bureau at the mouth of the Columbia River. Additionally, he served as a telegraph operator and was instrumental in installing the cable running under the Columbia from Fort Stevens, Oregon, to Fort Canby, Washington.

He resigned from the military service and shortly thereafter became co-owner of Griffin and Reed, a stationery and book store in Astoria, Oregon. This business was located on the northeast corner of 11th and Commercial Streets. The partnership dissolved in November, 1902 and John N. Griffin continued the business alone.

By 1905, he constructed his own building in which he reopened his bookstore in October of 1905. However, he sold the business a month later and moved his family to California where they remained for only six months before returning to Astoria.

In that same year, John N. Griffin established the Astoria Abstract Co. in partnership with his brother-in-law Edward Z. Ferguson. He sold out his interest in this firm in 1920.


In 1888, John N. Griffin married Ada Ferguson, daughter of Albert W. Ferguson, architect and builder of Astoria, and sister to Edward Z. Ferguson of the Astoria Abstract Co., and to James Ernest Ferguson, builder of the Old Astoria City Hall, the Elks Temple, Grace Episcopal Church, and many other historic residences in building in Astoria. It is a family legend that the newly-wedded couple were given the small house at 1643 Grand Avenue as a wedding gift from the Ferguson family. It is located next door to the large Albert W. Ferguson residence and was built in 1892. Certainly, the house was built by James Ernest Ferguson and shows the same kind of skill and craftsmanship that is so apparent in other Ferguson-built houses and buildings in Astoria.

John N. Griffin was interested in civic affairs and served as an Astoria city councilman, in 1892, as a member of the Astoria school board in 1908, and as a member of the Astoria Cemetery Commission in 1921.



He was also one of the first Clatsop County residents to appreciate the beauties of the Oregon coast. He purchased a 160 acre homestead in 1892 Cannon Beach, a small ocean-side community, and built a summer home there in 1897 which still stands. For almost eighty years, the Griffins enjoyed using this place for summers and for other vacations.

John N. Griffin still occupied the nominated property whe he died in Astoria on June 30, 1928. His wife, Ada Ferguson Griffin, continued to occupy the house with other family members until her death in 1937. The current owners, Dr. and Mrs. Gary Boelling, have restored the house to its original elegance and maintain its fine condition .
