#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The general exterior appearance of the Hotel Wm. Barkley is of a Renaissance Revival brick building. It is of solid brick and tile, three stories in height fronting on Lincoln Avenue, fifty feet in width, and occupying two full lots.

The hotel construction began in 1914 and the Hotel Kaddatz was opened in 1915 on its present site. The name was changed to Hotel Wm. Barkley sometime after Barkley purchased the hotel in 1920.

The exterior brick used was a new type for the Fergus Falls area and the Hotel Kaddatz was the first building in town constructed with this type of brick. It had a rough, dark finish and considered to be almost as hard as stone. It was manufactured at Coon Creek in Ottertail County.

The hotel consisted of a section presently facing West Lincoln Avenue and an annex located to the rear and across the alley. The annex to the building was constructed first to provide a location for the Kaddatz Restaurant.

Later, the annex housed the hotel bakery and the sample rooms. It was of brick and three stories high, connected to the main hotel facing Lincoln Avenue by an underground tunnel and an overhead enclosed bridge. Because of its dangerously dilapidated condition, it was condemned as unsafe by the City of Fergus Falls and demolished in 1981.

In approximately 1936 the first story of the hotel building was remodeled to house a shoe shop on the west side and a haberdashery on the east side. The lobby was made smaller, with the coffee shop in the back of the building.

In 1940, the entire ground floor became the home of the Scott-Burr department store which featured an art-deco style first floor store front on the original facade.

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Although the ground floor was altered in 1936 and the original hotel lobby reduced in size, the two upper guest room floors remain essentially intact. These floors contained 75 sleeping rooms, each equipped with hot and cold running water; 30 rooms have private baths. Woodwork, including doors and mouldings, is of mahogany. An ornately carved mahogany fireplace and multilight chandelier remain in the former Womens' Parlor on the second floor streetfront. The present lobby finish consists of oak woodwork, terrazzo floor, and light tan Tennessee marble wainscoting.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

In 1886 Charles W. Kaddatz, one of the earliest pioneers of Fergus Falls and one of its most energetic business men, came to Fergus Falls and established a fruit and confectionery business. "From this he branched into the bakery business which he conducted with success until 1914 at which time he built the large hotel, long famed as 'The Kaddatz'. This /hotel became/ one of the leading hotels of western Minnesota." (Mr. Kaddatz's other interests were extensive, including the Red River (flour) Milling Company of Fergus Falls, the First State Bank, the Bank of Foxhome, Minnesota, and the Fergus Falls Casket Factory.)

Mr. Kaddatz' decision that a modern, up-to-date hotel was necessary in Fergus Falls was in response to the Federal Court considering a move to a community with better accommodations. The building of the Hotel Kaddatz was instrumental in keeping the Federal Court in Fergus Falls as the judges and other court officials constantly made use of the hotel's facilities. Keeping the Federal Court in town was a major factor in promoting Fergus Falls as the center of activity in the northwestern region of Minnesota.

The hotel also featured sample rooms for traveling salesmen to display their wares. As a result, Fergus Falls became the busiest merchandising center in western Minnesota.

The construction and expansion of the Hotel Kaddatz was a significant event in the economic growth of Fergus Falls. The Fergus Falls Weekly Journal stated on February 11, 1915, "The completion of such a hotel as this marks a new era in the history of the city. Gatherings of every kind will hereafter find ample accommodations here, and traveling men from far and near will find accommodations equal to those of the finest hotels in the Twin Cities or Chicago."

The hotel was a major area employer along with Otter Tail Power Company and Fergus Falls State Hospital. It was a showcase for all the then modern conveniences. The top two floors featured 75 sleeping rooms, all equipped with hot and cold running water, with thirty of them having private baths. It also featured a private telephone system with a phone in each room and a central switchboard. The Northwestern Telephone Co. also had two long distance booths in the hotel for long distance telephoning: The dining room was electrically illuminated by an indirect lighting system.

The fact that a superior businessman, such as Mr. Kaddatz, found a potential for investment in a major hotel operation was considered a turning point in the economic development of Fergus Falls. The city changed within a decade from a prairie town to an urban center with a sense of permanent economic stability. The impact of the river, the railroad and the growing highway system all contributed to the modern development of Fergus Falls evidenced by the construction of the city's first major hotel, The Kaddatz.
