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The George W. Hubbard home was built in 1921 for Dr. Hubbard as he retired as president of Meharry. It was financed by the trustees and alumni and cost more than \$17,000 when built. Today it is the last remaining vestige on what was the original Meharry campus.

Meharry Medical College was organized in 1876 as the medical department of Central Tennessee College. In 1900, the name was changed to Meharry Medical College of Walden University. By 1915 a separate charter was granted to Meharry by the State of Tennessee.

Meharry, organized to train Negroes in the fields of medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, and nurses training, takes its name from the generous and philanthropic family who gave liberally toward its establishment and support.

However, Dr. George W. Hubbard, a white man who was a native of New Hampshire, is credited with pioneering and inaugurating the first directed medical schooling for the Negro in the South. George Hubbard (1841-1924) came to the South during the Civil War and remained to graduate from the Medical Department of Vanderbilt University in 1879. In 1876 he was appointed by the Freemen's Aid Society of the M. E. Church to organize a medical department in Central Tennessee College. This department has since been known as Meharry Medical College and was the first medical school established in the South for the education of Negro phyisians. Dr. Hubbard served the college in many capacities and finally served as president from 1916 until his retirement in 1921. During his 42 years there, more than onehalf the South's physicians, dentists, and pharmacists graduated from Meharry.

By the late 1920's, Meharry had outgrown its old plant, and new property was acquired in northwest Nashville where a modern school and hospital, costing over 2 million dollars, were erected during the year 1930-31. It has continued to expand and there today Meharry Medical School, along with Hubbard Hospital, make up one of the South's leading medical training centers.

DESCRIPTION	The Hubbard House is a two-story frame and masonry structure constructed in 1920. The house was designed in the "Four-Square" Colonial Revival style and features an extended front porch and a hipped roof. At the main entrance is a fanlight and sidelights. The porch is composed of paired rectangular columns with Doric motif capitals. Windows on the main facade are six-over-six sash with flanking smaller four-over-four sash windows. On the south facade is a bay window. On the main facade of the hipped roof is a dormer with casement windows and exposed eave rafters. The interior of the house has had some remodeling but still exhibits its original design and woodwork.					
IGNIFICANCE	The Hubbard House was constructed in 1920 and designed by Moses McKissack. The building is the only remnant of the original Meharry Hospital which surrounded the house in 1920. 1876 until 1921. Upon his retirement the trustees and alumni raised \$17,000 to construct this home. Hubbard occupied the home until his death when it became the property of the Seay-Hubbard Church. In the late 1920s the Meharry Medical College outgrew its original location on First Avenue, South and moved to a new location in north Nashville in 1930-31. In 1970 the Hubbard House became the property of Seay-Hubbard Church for use as its parsonage. Because of the building's association with the original campus the Hubbard House was placed on the National Register in 1973.
