BOONE-MURPHY-MOORE HOUSE

INTEGRITY:

The historic integrity that the 4th Avenue neighborhood once possessed is no longer present. Although the neighborhood remains mainly residential, other uses have begun to move in. For example, the *Pine Bluff Commercial* has a facility to the north of the property on the north side of the railroad tracks. Additionally, Smart Chevrolet has a large repair facility located just east of the house. The house is located on the south side of the 4th Avenue Railroad tracks and faces north. A vacant lot is to the west of the property and houses are located to the south and west.

REASON FOR THE MOVE:

The Boone-Murphy-Moore House (NR listed 02/14/79) is presently located at 714 West Fourth Avenue where it was moved in 1977. According to several sources this house was originally located at 702 West Second Avenue, and the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps for Pine Bluff from 1896-1920 confirm the location.

The Heckatoo Historical Society is the current owner of the house, and because the organization is inactive, they have offered to deed the house to the Pine Bluff/Jefferson County Historical Museum. The house has suffered neglect and vandalism in past years and Heckatoo Historical Society believes that unless the house is moved and restored, it will deteriorate beyond repair. The museum cannot oversee the safety or restoration of the house in its current. location.

PROCEDURE FOR THE MOVE:

Presently, the plans are to use the Jefferson County Road Department to move the small house. The county has enough men and equipment to handle this move. In past years, this same road department successfully moved the Bunyare-Rice log cabin from its first location on the Jefferson–Lonoke County Line to Pine Bluff. Later the department moved the cabin to Rison, Arkansas, Pioneer Village, where it still stands today.

NEW LOCATION SETTING AND PROPOSED ORIENTATION:

The Boone-Murphy-Moore House will be moved to a lot recently acquired by the museum on Third Avenue between State and Alabama streets directly in front of the PB/JC Museum. The house is planned to be oriented facing north, as it is in its current location. The museum is located on Fourth Avenue between the same streets. On this property is a large concrete foundation which was probably the foundation of the warehouse located on the lot. Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps for Pine Bluff indicate that the lot was Jarratt and Hastings (later Pittman and Williams), a lumber concern, from at least 1889 through at least 1896. By 1901, a small "beer depot" was on the northwest side of the lot, which was greatly expanded into a wholesale liquor facility by 1908. Also, by 1908 the St. Louis Southwestern Railway Freight Depot was built to the north of the spur line that crossed the lot diagonally. Both of these facilities remained on the lot through at least 1920, according to the Sanborn maps. At present, only a fence separates this lot from the museum parking lot, and it will be removed.

Other structures in this area that were of that vintage are no longer standing, but the location of the Battle of Pine Bluff during the Civil War is only one block away. The museum is housed in the former Union Train Station built in 1906 (NR listed December 14, 1978) and is located to the south of the proposed site. All buildings across Third Street to the north, which are commercial buildings, are presently being demolished to make way for a parking lot. Land to the east of the proposed site is a mixture of light industrial and vacant land, and the new Pine Bluff jail is being constructed to the northeast of the lot. Land to the west is commercial in nature. It is the plan of the committee overseeing this relocation to erect a fence to protect the proposed site.

SIGNIFICANCE:

Thomas A. Boone built the house in 1860 and apparently died soon afterwards. This small house was the second headquarters of the Union Army during its occupation of Pine Bluff (the headquarters of General Powell Clayton) from 1863-1865 and is one of the very few antebellum houses left in Pine Bluff.

Boone had mortgaged the house to Robert S. Thompson and William H. Dupuy, and when the loan was not paid, the property was sold to John P. Murphy. As a bridal gift, Murphy deeded the house to his wife, and two years after Murphy's death in 1892, Mrs. Murphy (formerly Mary K.

"Mollie" Jones) moved the house to the west side of the lot. Mollie Murphy married Charles F. Moore in 1895.

The Trinity Episcopal Church bought the house from the Murphy-Moore estate and in 1977 gave the house to the Pine Bluff Women's Center. The Center had the house moved to its present location and restored to original appearance. The house was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on February 14, 1979.

Although the proposed location for the house is not residential in nature, the house has already been moved once, in 1977. As a result, the current setting does not reflect the house's historic setting. In addition, moving the house to a location near the Pine Bluff/Jefferson County Historical Museum will allow the house to be easier managed by the museum and will also allow greater access to the property by the public.





DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Boone-Murphy-Moore House, built prior to 1861, was originally a single pile with central hall. The plan is rectangular. The structure has been much altered. There are shed additions to the east and west sides. Two small porches with turned posts are encased in these additions. The barge boards and roof cresting were added in the 1880's. The roof is tin shingles and the house is weatherboard.

Plywood covers two saddlebag porches with turned posts and sawn brackets. The house is scheduled to be restored to its original exterior appearance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to several sources the small Boone-Murphy-Moore house which was originally located at 702 West Second Avenue, Pine Bluff, was the second headquarters of the Union Army during its occupation of the town from 1863 to 1865. The first headquarters of Colonel Powell Clayton's troops was the Taylor-Portis home at 216 East Second Avenue. (This house was razed in 1962.) During the battle of Pine Bluff on October 25, 1863, Colonel R. C. Newton's Fifth Arkansas Cavalry took the headquarters and Newton took all of the papers found in Clayton's adjutant-general's office. After the battle the Union Army revamped the location of their forces and built breastworks to make defense of the town easier. This was probably when the headquarters was moved to Curran (Beech) Street and Lake (Second) Avenue.

In a series of land transactions, Thomas A. Boone had acquired Lots 1 and 2, Block 33 of Woodruff's addition, west, on April 9, 1860.3 The 1860 census of Pine Bluff shows Boone, 28, was a merchant. His wife was Emily R. Boone, 25, and they had two children, J. E. Boone, 6, a daughter, and Robert B. Boone, 4 a son. The Foones were born in South Carolina and their children in North Carolina which indicated they were newcomers to Arkansas. The Boones built a home on the lots in 1860. The assessment and tax records of Jefferson County for 1861 show Mrs. Emily R. Boone owned two city lots valued at \$4,000, household furniture valued at \$500 and two slaves. The house was apparently financed by a loan obtained by Boone and his wife from Richard H. Martin of Dallas County. The two lots and 960 acres of land were given as security. This loan was paid off and on February 2, 1861, Boone borrowed money from Robert S. Thompson and his partner William H. Dupuy using the city property and land for security.

Mrs. Martha Harvie Marks Hudson gave this personal remembrance of Pine Bluff during the Civil War:

Mrs. Frazier lived close to my father (at Marks' Mill). She had a large home and fine servants. One time she was giving a house party and I was one of the guests, when we looked down the road, the whole earth seemed full of Bluecoats. They always put the spur to their horses when they came in sight of a house, to keep anyone from escaping. General C....(Clayton) and officers dashed in, sat down and brought Negroes to the table, just to tease Mrs. Frazier. She was furious, and said: 'Make those Negroes get up from my table.' She would have said more, but we gathered around her, begged her to hush, or they

The Boone-Murphy-Moore House represents, to the city of Pine Bluff, the city's associations with the Civil War. It is one of the very few structures accepted to have been related to the War. Despite the changes from original location and alterations of appearance, the small house has survived over one-hundred years. The present owner of the house, the Pine Bluff Women's Center, Inc., has taken great pride in the historical value of the house and is carefully working with the Technical Services division of the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program in restoring it to near original condition. The Boone-Murphy-Moore House has been moved to its present site of a demolished historic sturcture, thus contirbuting greatly to the visual continunity of the streetscape.

would burn the house down. That quieted her, and they soon cleaned up everything on the table.

After they had eaten, they came and sat down without being invited. General C. said: 'Why don't you come to Pine Bluff?' I answered: 'Because you won't let us.' He said, ' Come up and send word to headquarters, and I will let you in. ' He kept his word, and when we rode up (to Pine Bluff) on the old horses they had left us, in place of our fine ones, and gave our names to the picket, General C. sent word to pass us in. The home of Mrs. Charles F. Moore, 702 West Second Avenue, one story then, was his headquarters.

After the Civil War Boone had not paid off his mortgage to Thompson and Dupuy and on December 15, 1866, Thompson, as the surviving member of the firm brought a foreclosure suit.9 The court appointed Charles M. Bagg commissioner to sell the property and at a public auction held on the courthouse steps June 2, 1867, David W. Carroll as trustee for Thompson bought the property. 10 Carroll sold the house and lots to John P. Murphy on January 14, 1871, for \$2,900.11

Murphy, a native of Ireland, born in 1843, came to Pine Bluff in 1859. He joined the Jefferson Guards as a private and served in the Confederate Army throughout the war. 12 After the war he entered business in Pine Bluff and the 1870 census showed he owned real estate worth \$2,000 and personal property valued at \$10,000.13

Murphy married Mary (Mollie) K. Jones at the home of her grandfather by marriage, Creed Taylor of New Gascony, on April 8, 1875, an elaborate affair which included a river excursion on the Steamer "Belle of Texas." L As a bridal gift on the eve of his wedding Murphy deeded the house and lots to his wife. 15 The Murphys lived there until he died on December 16, 1892. 16 He was survived by his wife and two sons, Carter Boone and Clifton P. Murphy. 17 In August, 1894, Mrs. Murphy. moved the house to the West side of Lot 2 and constructed a large two and half story house with tall columns - a virtual southern mansion. 18 The small house was used as a servants' quarters first and later as a storeroom. Mrs. Murphy married Charles F. Moore at the St. Joseph's Catholic Church, June 14, 1895.19

After acquiring the property from the Murphy family, The Trinity Episcopal Church razed the big home and moved the small house to the back of Lot 1 to make room for a day school. The small house was used as a residence and in recent years, as a day school office and library.

Carter B. Murphy's daughter, Elizabeth, said her grandmother told her the small house in the side yard was used as a Union troop's headquarters. Nancy Rundle also said the house was used as the Union Headquarters in her account of the Battle of Pine Bluff.

In the spring of 1977 the Trinity Episcopal Day School decided to further expand the school facilities. To do this the space occupied by the small house was needed. The house was given to the Pine Bluff Women's Center provided they could find a lot for it. A lot was obtained at 714 West Fourth Avenue and the house was moved in June, 1977. The Women's Center is planning to restore the house and use it for an organizational headquarters.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Built in 1860 as a simple, frame dwelling, the Union Army Headquarters House is an altered, one-storey, weatherboarded, structure resting on concrete piers and surmounted by a gable roof with metal cresting and finials along the ridge line. The southern halves of two nearly full-length porches on the east and west elevations have been altered to form small, shed-roof, room additions. The main access to the house is provided by doors centering the porches.

The house has experienced a change in setting brought about by moves occurring in 1894, 1970 and 1977. In 1894 the building was moved to the rear of its original grounds at 702 West Second Avenue (see map) to make room for a large Classic-Revival house. In 1970 it was again moved to a new location on the original grounds (see map) by Trinity Episcopal Church which built an addition to its school on the site. At this time the placement of the house in relation to the street was changed and what is now the north elevation became the only elevation fronting the street. In its original corner location both the north and east elevations fronted streets. Finally, threatened with demolition, as plans were drawn to expand the school, the Union Army Headquarters House was moved to its present location at 714 West Fourth Avenue--approximately two blocks from its original location. The north elevation continues to front the street at its present site.

In addition to a change in setting, the house has experienced a change in appearence most notably observed in the late-Victorian embellishment of the exterior of the building's north elevation. An elaborate, curvilinear, jig-saw cut, vergeboard decorates the gable-end of the north (front) elevation. A pendant descends from the apex of the vergeboard gable trim. Also, located in the gable-end is a large, round, louvered attic vent. Beneath the gable-end is a bracketed cornice of distinctive design. The vergeboard, louvered vent, bracketed cornice and roof cresting were all added ca. 1885 and, though not contemperary with the construction of the house, they are its most noteworthy design features.

Turned-posts sustain the porches, corner boards define the wall edges, and door trim and window encasements are simple.

The original section encloses three rooms and the shed additions enclose two rooms. The simple interior molding is probably original. The fireplace has been removed, but otherwise, there are few obvious alterations to the interior.

A 1977 restoration of the house resulted in the partial restoration of the two Victorian porches and the application of exterior paint in Victorian colors. Staff members of the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program assisted in the project by providing information on paint selection.

While the new location of the Union Army Headquarters House is more cramped than the original site of the building, it is located in the same neighborhood with the original site and shares with that site a similar visual environment. Furthermore, the house contributes to the overall appearence of the row of small, frame houses of which it is now a part by filling a gap in the streetscape created some time ago when a small, turn-of-the-century-house located on the site was demolished. The Trinity Episcopal Church day school now covers the original site of the Union Army Headquarters House.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Union Army Headquarters House is a small, frame-dwelling which served from 1863-1865 as the second headquarters for the Union occupation forces in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. The building which first served as the Union headquarters was demolished in 1962. Though not an imposing structure, the Union Headquarters House is one ofavery small number of antebellum houses that survive in Pine Bluff, a city of 60,000, which during the 1860's was an important cotton center and port on the Arkansas River. The house is the most important reminder of the Union occupation of the city during the Civil War. The commander of the the Federal forces in the city, Powell Clayton, later became the 16th governor of Arkansas and the Union Army Headquarters House is one of the most significant surviving buildings that is associated with him. Though moved several times and altered, the house does possess several outstanding architectural details which were added to it in the 1880's.

In 1860, Thomas A. Boone, the original owner of the Union Army Headquarters House, purchased two lots at the corner of Second Avenue and Beech Street in Pine Bluff. Tax records indicate that at this time the house was built for Boone. Boone, a merchant, lost title to the property when a pre-Civil War loan on it was foreclosed after the end of the war.

During the Civil War, the house achieved local reknown when it was selected by the occupying Federalsfor use as their second headquarters in the city. The initial occupation of Pine Bluff was peaceful—even cordial. On September 14, 1863, four days after the fall of the state capitol, Little Rock; 35 miles miles to the north, to invading Federal forces under Major General Frederick Steele, Union occupation troops arrived in Pine Bluff at the request of prominent local citizens who desired trade the with the Federals and protection for their cotton from marauding guerillas. forces numbered over 500 men under the command of Colonel Powell Clayton.

One other National Register property, the Crescent Hotel in the Eureka Springs Historic District, is associated with Clayton, the governor of Arkansas from 1868-1871. Clayton is considered to be the most influential Reconstruction-era politician in Arkansas and civil rights and education both made tremendous gains during his tenure as governor.

On October 25, 1863, the first building used as headquarters by the Federals was briefly captured during an unsuccessful attack on the city by Confederates under the command of Brigadier General John S. Marmaduke. After the Battle of Pine Bluff, Clayton, for stategic reasons, moved his headquarters to the Thomas Boone House on the corner of Second Avenue and Beech Street where it remained for the duration of the war.

In 1871 John P. Murphy bought the Union Army Headquarters House and its estate of two lots at a public auction. Murphy, an Irish immigrant and fairly successful, local businessman, lived in the house until his death in 1892. His Widow, Mary Murphy, moved the house to the west end of lot 2 in 1894 (see map) in order to make room for a large Neo-Classic house which she erected on the corner. Subsequently, the Union Army Headquarters House was used as a servant's residence and later as a storage building. In 1895, Mrs. Murphy married Charles F. Moore and the Headquarters House remained in their family until it was sold with the estate to Trinity Episcopal Church.

Since its acquisition by the Church, the house has been moved twice; both times to accommodate expansions in the Trinity Episcopal Church day school. The first move occurred in 1970 (see map) and the most recent in 1977 when the house was turned over to the Pine Bluff Women's Center under the stipulation that they move the structure. The building was moved by the Women's Center in June of 1977 two blocks to the west of its original location. While the

the new site of the Headquarters House is more cramped than the original location of the building, it is located in the same neighborhood with the original site, and shares with that site a similar

visual environment. Furthermore, the house contributes to the overall appearence of the row of small, frame houses of which it is now a part by filling a gap in the streetscape created some timesago when a small, turn-of-the-century-house occupying the site was demolished. In fact, the durability of the Union Army Headquarters House--the unwillingness of its various owners to destroy it--testifies to the high level of significance with which it is regarded locally. Of the hundreds of pre-Civil War buildings which must have once formed Pine Bluff, the Union Army Headquarters House is one of less than a dozen survivors.

Built as a simple, frame dwelling, the house is an altered, one-storey, weatherboarded, structure resting on concrete piers and surmounted by a gable roof distinguished by metal cresting and two finials along the ridge line. The southern halves of two, nearly full-length, porches on the east and west elevations have been altered to form small, shed-roof additions. The main access to the house is provided by single-leaf doors centering the porches.

The original section of the house contains three rooms and the enclosed porch additions enclose two small rooms. The simple interior molding is probably original. The Fireplace has been removed, but otherwise, there are few obvious interior alterations

The most notable, and for Pine Bluff--significant, architectural features of the building are changes made to its north elevation around 1885. Amoung these significant embellishments are a large, round louvered vent in the gable-end, an elaborate, curvilinear, jig-saw cut, vergeboard also in the gable-end, a pendant that descends from the apex of the vergeboard, and a distinctive bracketed cornice. The style of these decorative features is unusual for Pine Bluff.

The Pine Bluff Women's Center conducted a partial restoration of the house in 1977. The Victorian porches were partially restored and new exterior paint was applied in colors reccomended by the staff of the Arkansas Historic Preservations Program. The building now serves as the headquarters for the Pine Bluff Women's Center.

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




