The Henry and Elizabeth Adkinson Evans House is the latest example in the county of a transitional farm residence built of limestone. It is the only extant symmetrical massed rectangle house.

The square two story hip roofed house is constructed of locally quarried ashlar. The east main entrance facade has an entrance on the left and a window on the right with two second story windows above. There is a walk out basement with a ground level entrance on the left. The main floor has a porch across it that covers the basement entrance. It has been enclosed to make a garage. The north public facade has an enance on the right and window on the left with two windows above in the second story. The west facade has two windows at the first floor and two above in the second story. The south facade has a covered entrance and two second story windows.

The house is built of dimension ashlar with two against one bond. Quoins and jambs are chamfered. Lintels have protruding cornices. Sills are protruding. The hipped roof has closed overhanging eaves and verges. There is a chimney in the center of the roof.

Theme(s) Early Settlement

Henry Evans came to the county with his mother when he was 14. He helped her farm 175 A. near Buffalo. After her death, he inherited 100 A. in 1875. He opened a quarry, cut the stone and built the house about 1885. This is the last of the stone houses to have been built by local builders who quarried native limestone.
