The Captain George McManus House is located on the south side of Lincoln Street in Brunswick, Maine. The house stands on a street of several handsome, mid-nineteenth brick residences. These houses exhibit either the Greek Revival or Italianate styles or a combination of both. The McManus House of 1857 displays a transition of Greek Revival and Italianate forms.

The McManus House has a granite foundation and is of brick construction with granite, wood, and cast iron trim. The main part of the dwelling is basically square and stands two stories high with a hipped roof. The north or facade elevation and the east and west or side walls each have a large recessed brick panel in the Greek Revival manner. Within the panel of facade are three windows on each of the two stories. The first story windows have an elongated rectangular shape with wooden sills and granite lintels in the Greek Revival style. The second story windows are arched in the Italianate manner. Between the first and second stories is a highly decorative cast iron balcony.

The main entrance to the McManus House is located on the east wall. At the southeast corner of the walls is situated a brick projection with a recent Colonial Revival doorway and glass enclosure on the front and two original, elongated narrow windows on the side. The roof of the brick entranceway extends along the east side of the house and serves as an open This porch is supported at its foremost point by a square wooden An intricate cast iron railing runs from the entranceway to the pier, Underneath the porch at the northeast corner of the east wall is an elongated rectangular window similar to those on the first story of the facade. The wooden porch cornice has a pronounced Italianate overhang and such Italianate features as a dentil moulding and cornice brackets. The second story of the east wall displays two arched windows identical to those on the second story of the facade. The west wall possesses two windows on The first story windows are the same as those on the first story facade, while the second story windows are identical to those on the second story facade.

The hipped roof has a dramatic projecting overhang which is ornamented by a dentil moulding and a series of large wooden brackets. A two story rectangular brick ell extends perpendicular from the south or rear wall of the house. A hipped roof with a continuation of the Italianate cornice treatment of the house is present on the ell. There are three original tall thin, brick chimneys on the house and one later chimney on the ell. A decorative cast iron fence set in granite fronts the yard.

The Captain George McManus House has escaped any significant changes on either the exterior or the interior. It has survived more than a century in sound condition and continues to emanate the restrained dignity and elegance which its first mariner owner sought to display.

The Captain George McManus House of 1857 is a fine example of a transitional Greek Revival-Italianate residence of the Maine mid-coast The 1850's were very much a Victorian decade in the history of Brunswick architecture. Italianate designs with projecting rooflines became common and were complemented by ornate brackets and intricate ironwork. Brick was the preferred building material. Interiors evolved from the lighter, classical designs to more full bodied and ornamental forms. Most of the houses of this period have a massive character and internal evidence suggests that they were more sturdily built than their earlier neighbors. While not quite as large as some other mid-century houses of its type, the McManus residence exhibits a more carefully conceived design than its comtemporaries in the Brunswick area. Great attention was given to proportion and detail with no significant inconsistency. Regrettably, the name of the architect remains unknown.

The house was built as the result of the successful maritime career of Captain George McManus, a prominent Brunswick master mariner. McManus lived in the house until his/death about 1864. Subsequent owners were two generations of the Lufkin family (1873-1928) and the Richardson family (1928-1960). Both families were prominent in Brunswick affairs. Since the early 1960's, the house has been used as the parsonage of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. The Pejepscot Historical Society, one of Maine's oldest historical organizations is currently considering acquisition of the property to adapt for a museum of Brunswick area history. This proposal would offer the ideal solution for preserving a house which is both architecturally and historically significant to its community by making it the setting for a distinguished collection of regional artifacts.
