Bays 2 & 4 extend forward; quatrefoil motif on deep gable bargeboards w/ single casements at center.

Square sided bracketed triple bay window w/ shed roof at center 2nd floor & wall forms overhang w/ square ended, evenly spaced brackets above large (4 way) 1st floor window. Bay 1 projects forward w/ triple window 1st & 2nd floors, roof forms gambrel to the south.


Entrance at center up six risers below shallow open front porch w/ square columns on low brick piers; ogee arch above, trefoil motif in spandrels & bracketed roof; paired casements in projecting 2nd floor bay w/ half-timbered gable overhead.

Square diamond-light casements flank entrance; a band of 3 leaded windows below eaves on 2nd floor. Paired diamond paned shed dormers flank entrance gable on front roof.

SITING, BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION, AND RELATED STRUCTURES:

House sited up steep slope at center of 155' \times 353'lot. Walk-way leads to broad terrace across east (front elevation). Driveway to the north $w/2$ gable fronted outbuildings, garage below on north-west corner of lot. + one acre.

SIGNIFICANCE:
The architect used symmetrical massing and imaginative half-timber details in his design of this spectacular Tudor home.
It would make an interesting study comparing this residence w/ #35 Afterglow Way, another Norris Elizabethan home. Here the architect returns to stucco, his favorite material, & used stepped Flemish gables to balance the exterior facade. Both homes have a variation of the same delicate leaded window tracery.
The home, built for Mr. Charles R. Coffin, is pictured on the cover of the Nov. 1902 edition of the "Scientific American Building Monthly". There is a lengthly description of the house & numerous pictures of its elaborate interior. This residence was included in Architectural League of New York Annual Exhibition,
Catalogue #461; Harry Finn, delineator; 1901.
