Summary Paragraph

Located on Main Street (route 66), the Creek Masonic Lodge #226 faces west. The two story brick clad building is designed in the Neo-Classical style. Located to the south is a commercial district, to the west is an elementary school and to the north is a commercial district. The area services the travelers along Route 66. The Masonic Lodge building maintains excellent integrity.

Narrative Description

The façade, west elevation, is three bays wide. The central bay on the first floor is the main entry. It has stone steps with brick knee walls that lead to the central entry. The entry has two pane and panel wood doors and an elaborate stone surround. On either side of the door are Corinthian capital columns. A smooth frieze is directly above the doors. Above the frieze is an arched stone entablature with a scrolled stone keystone. Located in the entablature is a relief detail that resembles an "all seeing eye" with a light directly in the center. A non-historic metal awning is located directly above the door. Located on either side of the entry is a single oneover-one double hung window with a stone sill. The first floor around the entire building has

County and State alternating rows of protruding brick. Located at the southwest corner is corner stone with lodge

information inscribed. The second floor is separated from the first floor by an ornate beltcourse which serves as the sill for the five windows in the center bay. This beltcourse surrounds the entire building. Between each of the windows is an additional vertical stone detail. Located directly above each window is a small square stone detail. This area also has brick in a herringbone pattern. The windows have been covered with siding but remain behind the covering. Located in the outer bays of the second floor is a long vertical stone detail which includes iconography of the Masonic Order. The hipped roof is clad with composition shingles and has enclosed box eaves.

The south elevation is six bays wide. The basement level, located only at the east end of the building, has small hopper windows at the southeast corner. The basement and first floor are separated by a stone beltcourse. The southwest corner has a small ramp with brick knee walls that provide access to the wood door in the second bay of the first floor. The first and third bays each have a single one-over-one double hung window with a stone sill. Bays four, five and six each have paired one-over-one double hung windows with stone sills. The second floor has paired one-over-one double hung windows with stone sills in each bay. Above each window is a herringbone pattern in the brick with a small square stone detail. All of the second floor windows are covered with wood but remain intact.

The east elevation has the continuation of the beltcourse between the basement and first floor and the beltcourse between the first and second floor. The first floor has two pairs of two oneover-one double hung windows with stone sills. The second floor has two pairs of two one-overone double hung windows with stone sills. Above each window is a herringbone pattern in the brick with a small square stone detail. All of the second floor windows are covered with wood but remain intact.

The north elevation has two small one-over-one double hung windows with stone lintels in the first floor that from their placement, indicate an interior staircase. The second bay has a pair of one-over-one double hung windows with stone sills. The third bay has a single one-over-one double hung window with a stone still. Bays four, five and six each have paired one-over-one double hung windows with stone sills. The second floor has paired one-over-one double hung windows with stone sills in each bay. Above each window is a herringbone pattern in the brick with a small square stone detail. All of the second floor windows are covered with wood but remain intact.

The Lodge Room is located on the second floor. It is a large room of Masonic design traditionally running east to west. There are three officer stations: one on the east end; one on the south wall; and, one of the west end. Over the east and west stations are canopies which are ornate with shell shaped edging made of plaster. This detail consists of 32 individual shells which were individually molded and placed along the edge of the canopy. There is no other lodge in Oklahoma that has this detail.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Creek Masonic Lodge #226, at 417 North Main Street, is also located along historic Route 66. The property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A for Social History and Criteria C for Architecture. The period of significance dates to the construction of the building. Bristow's social history is entwined with that of the fraternal orders that bound businessmen and women together in social and public service. The building is also the only example of the Neo-Classical style in Bristow as applied to a building along Main Street. With excellent integrity, the Creek Masonic Lodge #226 is being nominated at the local level of significance.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least **one** paragraph for each area of significance.)

The Creek Masonic Lodge #226 is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A for social history as a representative of Bristow's fraternal order organizations. It is a meeting hall, for men, women and youth that provided a place for ritual and social interaction for a large group of citizens from its construction in 1918 until the present day.

Oklahoma's Masonic Order has a long history that goes back much further than statehood. Fraternal organizations such as the Masons provided much needed social bonding in a semifrontier area where social group interaction and communication only slowly developed. In 1868, Rev. Joseph S. Murrow organized Oklahoma Lodge No. 1 of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in Boggy Depot, Choctaw Nation, Indian Territory. Because lodges proliferated in the Indian Nations after that, in 1874Grand Lodge of Indian Territory was organized in Atoka. After 1907 statehood, in 1909 the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma united the Masons of the eastern and western parts of the state. The Masons were a vital aspect of eastern Oklahoma's and Bristow's social and business scene throughout the twentieth century. The fraternal organization experienced a rapid growth in the early 1920s. By 1925, 460 lodges operated in the state, and membership totaled 70,000, as estimated by Earl Fisher, Sr. Warden of the Grand Lodge of Oklahoma. In 1924, 4,963 members were initiated and 1,444 by affiliation in the Sooner State.¹

The Creek Masonic Lodge #226 dispensation was issued by the Grand Lodge of the Indian Territory June 16, 1903 just six years after the trading post of Bristow was established in 1897. Masonic work was performed and a charter issued on August 13, 1903 and given the name of Tuscan Lodge #134. At the time of statehood, it was determined that there were two Tuscan Lodges, one in Bristow I.T. and one in Ingersol, O.T which had been named such 6 month prior

County and State to the one in Bristow. Bristow's Masonic Lodge was renamed Creek Lodge #226 on February 2, 1909. At that time, the Masons were meeting in a hall above the Farmers State Bank on Main Street. Originally, the Lodge building was planned to be north of the Frisco railroad depot, it was determined that this location was too small for the new building. Lodge brother Bernard Jones, one of the founders of Bermont Oil Company, oversaw the hiring of an architect, the design, and construction of the new/current lodge. The building location ended up on three city lots. During construction, they ran into issues with material shortages due to the on-going war, World War I, but managed to complete the construction in 1918.

The Creek Masonic Lodge #226 is also significant under Criteria C as an excellent example of the Neoclassical architectural style. Neoclassical commercial style buildings have a prominent, symmetrically balanced façade. Commercial style versions are also constructed or brick or stone. Along with these standard details, the Creek Masonic Lodge #226 also has Corinthian columns with an arched entablature over the doorway, traditional one-over-one double hung windows and a heavy influence of the horizontal details in the multiple beltcourses. Public buildings and banks were perfectly suited for this style because it is very sober and orderly. This is the only extant example of this style on Main Street (Route 66) in Bristow and is an excellent local example of the use of this architectural style in Bristow.

The Creek Masonic Lodge #226 maintains a high degree of historic and architectural integrity. The property is significant for its association with Bristow's social history and as the only example of the Neo-Classical style in Bristow as applied to a building along Main Street.
