Two-story stone shed, tin roof, located along alley at rear of lot. Evidence of arched stone cellar window (?) at northwest corner of west face. Garage door added to south end of east face. Originally a smaller door at that point. Interior beams and floor extant, wooden partition divides structure into two rooms. Evidence of fireplace on west side of interior. There is some degree of deterioration, the walls need tuckpointing and the window sash is in bad repair, especially lintels. The ornate nature of the window sash would indicate that this was originally both shop and residence.
