Description

The Old Searcy Post Office is an Italian Renaissance style public building located on the southwest corner of Gum and Arch streets in downtown Searcy. Designed by architect Oscar Wenderoth, it was built at a cost of \$40,000 in 1914 and remained in use as a post office until the mid-1970's. It is still in good condition and is currently being used as a legislative facility.

The large, imposing structure has a rectangular, two-story floor plan and was built of reinforced concrete. The building underwent a \$250,000 expansion in 1959 with a rear (south) addition, also constructed of reinforced concrete, which housed two mail work rooms and office space. New glass and aluminum double doors on the front (north) elevation replace the original set, and the original two-over-two sash windows have been removed and replaced with eight-over-eight and one-over-one double-hung sash windows. Stylistically, the building features such Italian Renaissance elements as a flat, symmetrical front facade; a simple, low-pitched hipped roof; widely overhanging eaves supported by large brackets; and three full-height, recessed first-floor windows with arches above. Pilasters with Roman capitals flanking the first-floor windows, a belt course, and raised concrete keystones above all of the windows are other Italian Renaissance elements that are incorporated into the building's exterior design.

Another characteristic of the Italian Renaissance style, which this building also exhibits, is smaller and less elaborate fenestration on the upper story; however, these windows are also recessed with eight-over-eight double-hung sashes. A square, flat-topped cupola sits atop the shingle-covered hipped roof. The foundation is made of cast concrete and, according to historic photographs, was excavated by a mule-drawn scoop. Two original iron lampposts stand on either side of the front entrance as further reminders of the pre-war period in which this structure was built.

Searcy's original post office is the only Italian Renaissance style public building in White County and one of only a few such buildings in the entire state. It was constructed during a period of increasing prosperity and cultural awareness brought about by the emergence of the railroad, when more and more high-style public buildings and residences were designed and built [see the property type for Railroad Era Religious and Institutional Buildings and Historic Context 2: Railroad Era]. Yet because the Italian Renaissance style was ordinarily used for architect-designed landmarks in major metropolitan areas prior to World War I, it was rarely used in Arkansas' slowly developing, primarily vernacular towns. Therefore, the post office is significant on a local level under National Register Criterion C as a rare example of government-funded Italian Renaissance architecture.

While the building's architecture reflects an increased awareness and prosperity among Searcians, it also reflects the gradual increase in population, which, as discussed in the Historic Context and Property Type sections, was another of the railroad's effects on a community. With a population of just over 2000, only six postal employees, no city mail delivery and annual postage receipts of about \$8000, Searcy, like most other Arkansas towns, was actually too small to qualify for a postal facility. Yet in 1908, largely due to the efforts of Congressman Stephen Brundidge, the government approved the funding of a \$40,000 post office, making Searcy the second smallest town in the United States to secure such a building. Their efforts were well-timed, because in 1913 Congress passed the Public Buildings Act, which prohibited the construction of new post office buildings in communities whose postal receipts totaled less than \$10,000. But by 1916, two years after the Searcy post office was finally completed, the town's postal receipts amounted to over \$14,000, justifying the building's existence. Therefore, the building stands in testimony to the foresight of Searcy citizens, who believed in their town's potential for growth. For this reason, the post office is also significant under Criterion A as representing an important period of growth, prosperity and optimism in the state's history.
