A bas-relief seal of the City of Louisville decorates the central pilaster. The end bays project forward and contain entrys. The doors have stylized patterned surrounds and a stone lintel geometric design. A single window on the second floor is capped with the decorative lintels. The cornice of the entire building is one of its most striking decorative designs. It consists of a narrow band of brass in verticle and horizonal desings inset with shields.
