DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Squatter's Cabin stands in a beautiful grove of Giant Sequoia at the north end of Huckleberry Meadow in the Giant Forest of Sequoia National Park. The cabin is 14 feet, 2 inches by 16 feet, 4 inches and has only one room. The walls are of horizontal peeled logs, mainly White Fir. The gable ends are also made of horizontal logs. The corners are triangularly notched so as to fit together. The cabin still retains some wooden chinking between the logs. The south wall of the cabin has a door near the southwest corner. The door opening is 2 feet, 8 inches wide. A window 2 feet, 11 inches wide by 2 feet, 8 inches high allows light to enter from the west. The window has neither glass nor shutters. A dry-masonry chimney and fireplace stand as a part of the north wall. The roof frame is of local timber. A support post in the center of the cabin adds strength to this frame. The gable roof itself is of shales. The floor is dirt. A drainage system beneath the cabin removes excess moisture from the site. The cabin has been restored, but at an undetermined date. The site is accessible only by park trail.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Squatter's Cabin is of significance as a structure of the Kaweah Colony in the 1880's. It is also one of the few remaining structures in the Giant Forest. It should be preserved for future study and fields of exploration/settlement.

The cabin was erected c. 1886 by the Kaweah Cooperative to develop a utopian community. The colony was encouraged to settle in the Giant Forest so that the U.S. Government could control the area. The Kaweah Colony disbanded in 1893, and it is assumed that the cabin was abandoned at this time. It is assumed however, that the cabin remained in the Giant Forest until the 1930s when the Sequoia National Park was established.

There is no record of regular use of the cabin during the 1930s. It was used as a residence by park rangers and visitors, but today it stands empty.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Squatter's Cabin of Sequoia National Park is one of a few remaining structures of the Kaweah Colony, a socialistic enterprise of the late 1880's. It is also one of the oldest buildings remaining within Sequoia National Park. It should be considered of regional significance in the fields of exploration/settlement and social/humanitarian endeavor.

The cabin was erected circa 1886 by John Vest, a school-teacher-member of the Kaweah Cooperative Commonwealth, a socialist organization intending to develop a utopian community based on logging. Each member of the commonwealth was encouraged to file a timber claim on a section of the Giant Forest so that the entire tract would come under the organization's control. The Kaweah Colony claims on Giant Forest were filed in October, 1885, and it is assumed that Vest's claim was among them. After registering his claim, Vest proceeded to erect a simple cabin. He soon discovered, however, that the Huckleberry Meadow tract had already been sold under provision of the Swamp and Overflow Act to Hale Tharp, the pioneer resident of Giant Forest. Vest abandoned both his claim to the tract and the cabin.

There is no record of regular habitation of the cabin since that time. During the 1930s the cabin was apparently used as a trailside museum, but today it stands empty.

Commencing at the center point of an 18 inch wide burn scar on the trunk of an 18-foot diameter Sequoia tree, located 59 feet east of the southeast corner of the Squatter's Cabin, proceed south sixty (60) feet; thence west one hundred and sixty (160) feet; thence north one hundred and sixty (160) feet; thence east one hundred and sixty feet (160); thence south one hundred (100) feet to point of beginning.
