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Narrative Description

The historic Richmond Armory (MA-R-72) was built by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), and is located at the corner of 2nd Street and Moberly Avenue, outside the town square in Richmond. The Richmond Armory is similar to the Lexington Armory in that both buildings were constructed out of brick rather than concrete. The armory is two stories tall, and is composed of a central block flanked by two smaller wings. The armory has been painted yellow, and is in the shape of a "T." The armory is now home to the City of Richmond Recreation Center offices, and it serves as a youth and community center for the city. The Richmond and Lexington armories were designed by the Lexington architecture firm of Weber & Weber, and were built with money from the WPA. The building is topped by a flat roof which covers both the administrative building and the drill hall. The east elevation of the building is largely unadorned, with only a few architectural details. Vertical and horizontal ornamentation give the building an Art Deco appearance. Stepped vertical ornamentation around the doors, and bands of horizontal bricks around the second-story windows are reminiscent of the Art Deco style. The two glass front doors are replacements, while the single-pane windows are original. One of the front windows was closed up at an unknown date.

On the north side of the building, a fire escape and handicapped-accessible ramp were added, and the drill hall windows were replaced by glass block and louvered windows. At the rear of the building, two lower-level garage doors were replaced by double glass doors and sidelights.

On the interior of the building, offices, classrooms, and the drill hall make up the first two floors. Many of the original features of the building, such as its original wooden doors, original drill hall floor, original light fixtures, and original room configurations are intact. On the lower level (basement), there is one large room with smaller offices, store rooms, and a snack bar located off the main room. This "day room" serves as a gathering center for the community. Originally, this area served as a garage for the armory, but was converted into a day room in the late 1970s, after the city acquired the building. Interior renovations such as new electric wiring, central air, and HVAC systems were installed in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The historic Richmond Armory (MA-R-72) meets criteria A (historic associations), and criteria C (type of construction), of the National Register. The armory is a good example of Kentucky's National Guard buildings from the 1940s, and fits within the context of "Kentucky's National Guard Armories: 1934-1951." The armory served as both a military and community center during its period of significance, and it meets the registration requirements of location, materials, design, and setting. The building is in its original location and setting, outside the Richmond town square, and it is recognizable as an armory on both the interior and exterior. The building retains a high degree of integrity in its materials and appearance, and the design of the building is largely unchanged. The

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historic Richmond Armory has been a property of the City of Richmond since 1978, when the National Guard moved to a new armory on Irvine Road.

A military unit of some type has been in Richmond since 1916, when a unit was federally recognized there as Field Hospital Company No. 2. The unit was incorporated into the 113th Medical Regiment on February 16, 1923. Since that time, the unit has undergone several reorganizations, with a medical detachment located there during World War II. This unit served during the war in Ardennes, France, and the Argonne Forest. Units from Richmond have also served during the Korean War, and most recently, in Desert Storm. During Desert Storm, the 2123rd Transportation Company was stationed in Saudi Arabia and Kuwait, where they transported equipment such as tanks. The unit was overseas from October 1990 to July 1991. Besides the 2123rd Transportation Company, the 206th Engineers are also currently stationed in Richmond. The National Guard has been an important organization in Richmond, and they have participated in many projects both in the city and around the state. The WPA Armory is important for both its military and social ties. While the Guard was in the old armory, events such as sock hops, roller skating, church events, and baskethall games all took place there. Today, the old armory continues to serve the Richmond community in that capacity. The WPA Armory was built on the site of Caldwell High School, which burned down in the 1920s. The one-and-a-half acre lot then sat empty until construction of the armory began.

Verbal Boundary Description - the parcel designated by the Madison County PVA as tax map/parcel #R7-27-1.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The chosen boundary encompasses the lot historically associated with the Richmond WPA Armory, including the land on which the building sits, the surrounding parking lot, and front and side yards, for a total of 1.5 acres.
