Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located in Jefferson, Maine, the Dr. F.W. Jackson House is a large and splendid example of the Colonial Revival Style of architecture.

The Jackson House was designed by Samuel Patch of Waltham, Massachussetts with great flair and grandeur, the handsome structure was built in the years 1903-1905 with no expense spared. It is of frame construction, 3 1/2 stories tall with a clapboard exterior resting on a cut granite foundation. The roof is of gambrel construction both on the main house and the 2 1/2 story ell that runs off the house in an easterly direction. The house has three internal brick chimneys. The main facade faces in a westerly direction and is five-bays wide with basic 2/2 fenestration. Interupting the plane of the facade is a central pavilion with third story gambrelled dormer which contains a palladian window. Extending from the first floor of the house are flat roofed porticos supported by columns of the Doric order. The ends of the house are four-bays wide with 2/2 fenestration and each has a large third story palladian window. These windows are not found on the simpler two-bay wide ell but in their place are double windows with 2/2 fenestration. The overall effect of this house is that of a sprawling English mansion.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This extremely large and handsomely proportioned Colonial Revival country residence is the dominant architectural feature in the small rural community of Jefferson. It was built by Dr. Fred W. Jackson, a native of the community, who, after amassing a fortune through professional skill and matrimonial fortuitcusness, returned in grand style to his birthplace.

Dr. Jackson's career and the history of the house are well summed up in this quotation from the Lewiston Journal Illustrated Magazine of August 26, 1905:

"Dr. Jackson studied medicine and for several years practiced his profession in Providence, RI . There he built up a big practice and accumulated much property. To add to his general prosperity he united his fortunes with a cultured and wealthy lady of that city and together the couple came to the house of his youth where they have established one of the finest country homes in Maine. The doctor, freed from the necessity of practicing medicine for a living, is now devoting his entire time and attention to his elegant estate and it is fast assuming a finish equal to that of many an English nobleman. He has purchased no less than a thousand acres of land and this is being laid out in walks, groves and gardens with all the skill known to landscape gardening. A splendid home is this of Mr. and Mrs. Jackson."
