

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

A one-mile fragment of the Woods Trail skirts the western edge of Goose Lake Swamp in Sections 18, 19 and 20 of Polk Centre Township (T152N R45W). The fragment is still used as an unimproved, unmaintained, public road. It appears as a simple dirt track with a grassy crown. The track is approximately 9 feet wide. As a county road, however, the trail is legally defined to have a 66-foot right-of-way.

This trail fragment is part of a ten-mile segment of the Woods Trail which is still used as a public road but is largely unimproved. Unfortunately, gravel pits have altered large portions of the ten-mile segment, and this one mile stretch is one of the only portions which retains enough integrity to be nominated to the National Register.

The fragment begins in the SW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of Section 20, at a junction with Pennington County Road 10. The county highway engineer has posted a sign at the start of the fragment, correctly identifying the track as the "Historic Pembina Trail." From the county road, the trail runs to the northwest, staying within approximately 100 feet of the western edge of Goose Lake Swamp. The edge of the swamp marks what was once the eastern shore of glacial Lake Agassiz, and is part of a low ridge which runs from current-day Pembina to Detroit Lakes. The terrain is generally flat, open and grassy. The swamp is hidden from view by a line of trees, marking the transition from high to low ground. Midway across Section 19, the trail passes through a small, abandoned gravel pit. The site is overgrown and does not intrude on the setting.

The eligible fragment ends in the SW 1/4 of the SW 1/4 of Section 18, at a junction with a north-south gravelled road which marks the Pennington/Polk County boundary. Beyond this junction, the trail has been widened and gravelled, and it skirts several large, open gravel and sand pits.

It is difficult to determine how extensively the trail fragment has been altered, since the Red River Trails tended to vary in appearance and location from year to year. The 1874 federal land survey of the area, however, does show the trail skirting the western edge of Goose Lake Swamp, along the ridge of the ancient glacial lake shore, on the same alignment it follows today. Coupled with the fact that there is no evidence of grading, ditching or other improvements, it appears that the route and condition of the trail are unchanged. Similarly, the land around the trail has not been developed and does not appear to be under cultivation. Goose Lake Swamp, in particular, has maintained its original appearance. In both setting and physical condition, therefore, the integrity of the trail fragment is very high.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The site is a well-preserved fragment of the Woods Trail, and is significant in the context of the Red River Trails in Minnesota from 1835 to 1871. The trail fragment meets the following registration criteria: it conforms to the original route of the Woods Trail; it has excellent physical integrity, being an unimproved and unmaintained public road; it is in an undeveloped area which maintains its historic appearance; it is approximately one mile in length, and so long enough to evoke a sense of travel or function.

As part of the Woods Trail, the fragment was used for the Red River Trade from approximately 1844 to 1871. After long-distance trade ended in the early 1870s, most of the trail was eventually either improved for local traffic or abandoned. This trail fragment, however, is unusual in that it remained in public use but was never upgraded. It is actually part of a 10-mile stretch of unimproved road which follows the Woods Trail, and has been nominated for having the highest integrity. The fragment is the best Red River Trail remnant in the state, and an important, tangible link to the past.
