Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The John Hitch House is a two-story brick, asymmetrical plan, five bay brick residence built in 1918 with Colonial Revival and Bungalow influences. The house is of stretcher bond brick construction with a hipped roof of composition shingles, interior brick chimneys and a concrete foundation. On the main (E) facade is a one-story porch with original Bungalow design tapered brick columns and a solid brick railing. On the main (E) facade is a two-story projecting bay. The porch roof has wide eaves and the main roofline also has wide eaves with large modillion blocks. The main entrance has an original single light glass and frame door with single light sidelights. Secondary doors on the main facade are also original single light glass and frame design. Windows are rectangular one-over-one wood sash and over both doors and windows are soldier course lintels. In the gable field of the projecting second story bay are square wood shingles.

At the southwest corner is a one-story frame wing with ca. 1940 four light hinged casement windows and added tile siding. Also on the rear (west) facade is a ca. 1970 concrete deck. At the northwest corner is a ca. 1960, one-story frame addition with weatherboard siding and horizontal casement windows. The interior was inaccessible. At the rear is a ca. 1970 metal carport (NC) and original concrete, round well house built to house the well pump and water tank. This structure is approximately 20' high. (C) The house is located in a rural section of the county to the east of Maryville.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The John Hitch House is significant under criterion C for its architectural design. The house was built in 1918 in a T-plan form with Colonial Revival and Bungalow detailing. The house is one of three brick residences, and the only one with these particular stylistic details, built in the rural areas of the county in the early 1900s and reflects an era of growth and prosperity for county farmers. The house is one of the largest built in the county during this period. Additions to the house have been confined to the rear facade, are not readily visible and the house retains its original character and detailing.

John Hitch was born on October 23, 1871 in Blount County. He was the son of John Hitch Sr. who owned land in this section of the county. John Hitch was born in a log residence and grew up on his father's farm east of Maryville In 1899, Hitch purchased two adjoining tracts of land and built a five room frame home. Over the next two decades Hitch raised cattle and hogs and became one of the most prosperous farmers in the county. His farm became known as the Blue Grass Stock Farm and in 1918 built a 12 room brick home with two indoor baths. Upon completion the house was referred to as "the mansion in the Tennessee Mountains".

The home built by Hitch was a two-story brick residence with Colonial Revival and Bungalow detailing. The house is asymmetrical in design with a large one-story porch, tapered porch posts, and eave modillion blocks. When it was completed the house was one of largest built in the county and one of only three brick farm houses of the period. It is a fine example of the asymmetrical Colonial Revival style and is similar in design to the Samuel Yearout House, and James R. Davis House. John Hitch sold the house in 1923 and Lee Lambert purchased the 130 acre property in 1943 from Joseph Reynolds. The property is currently owned by the Lambert heirs.
