DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The present Adair County Courthouse was built on the site of the former courthouse, by order of the Adair County Fiscal Court on May 5, 1884. The courthouse was designed by McDonald Brothers, a noted Louisville, Kentucky firm at the turn of the century they also contributed important buildings to a large number of southern cities. The builder was <u>William</u> Henry Hudson, who was so proud of his work that he had his portrait carved in a capital on the porch. The Adair County Courthouse is a late <u>Victorian</u> variation on the typical earlier Kentucky county courthouse theme. It is located on a central city block, approached by major streets on all sides. It has several prominent facades and a

pyramidal overall massing that allows the building to dominate the county seat.

The design is difficult to describe stylistically. There are both medieval or High <u>Victorian Gothic elements</u> (the Romanesquoid columns of the main entrance), and Neogrec or <u>New Grecian</u> (the treatment of the brick walls, the angular detail of openings, and the overscaled incised Greek detail of the tower). Perhaps there are even suggestions of a belated <u>Second Empire</u> (steep four-sided roof that narrows to an octagon just below the crested pinnacle of the tower). The central entrance pavilions pierce the walls and roof of their sides, reaching a low brick gable with recessed segmental arch enclosing a Palladian motif below. The wall surfaces (and even chimneys) are divided vertically by plain panels flanking the tall narrow windows. Horizontally there are a stone foundation and belt course between stories and multiple dentilled cornices edging the hipped roof. There is much corbelling of brick courses throughout.

The four-sided clock in the tower is a town landmark. The two main entrances are on opposite ends of the building; their broad arched openings are linked by a central corridor. The sides of the structure are plainer and reveal the high round-arched windows that so often mark the second-story location of the courtroom in 19th-century courthouses. The interiors have been little altered, the woodwork and balustrades of the wide staircases being particularly interesting.

The Adair County Courthouse, the work of a private Kentucky firm, best known for their public buildings, is a mixture of architectural styles and elements and the ensemble has a striking urbanistic effect. In spite of the addition of low unobtrusive brick wings on either side, the building remains one of the bestpreserved of major late 19th-century Kentucky courthouses.

The Adair County Courthouse has been the center of activity in this community since the county was formed in 1801. A courthouse occupied the square in the center of town since 1806. This courthouse was replaced by the present courthouse in 1886. A large number of able and well-known lawyers have practiced their profession in the courthouse at Columbia, Kentucky.

One of the more prominent attorneys was <u>Frank Wolford</u>, who organized the First Federal Cavalry in Kentucky in 1861. General John Hunt Morgan, famous Confederate cavalry leader from Kentucky, suffered his first defeat at the hands of Colonel Wolford and his forces. In 1865 Wolford was sent from the 'Casey-Russell'' district to the state legislature and in 1867 was appointed Adjutant-General by Governor Stevenson. He returned to Columbia in the 1870's. In 1882 he was elected to Congress from the Fourth Congressional district and re-elected in 1884.

James R. Hindman was Captain of the 13th Kentucky Infantry, Union service, during the Civil War. In the 1870's Hindman led the fight to re-enact local option in Columbia making it the first municipality in the state to banish saloons. In 1883 Hindman was elected Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Kentucky.

There were other prominent members of the bar of Columbia. James Garnett, Sr. was Circuit Judge of the 7th Judicial District and an organizing director of the Bank of Columbia. His son, James Garnett, Jr., served as Attorney-General of Kentucky.
