

Narrative Description

The Triangle X barn (#707) is part of the outbuilding complex of the only dude ranch still in operation within Grand Teton National Park -- the NPS-licensed Triangle X. The ranch sits on the top of a colluvial fan immediately north of Shadow Mountain. The vegetation surrounding the site consists of mixed grasses and forbes as well as irrigated hay fields. These treeless meadows offer unobstructed views in all directions, including a panorama of the entire Teton Range and the Snake River. An unimproved dirt road provides access from Highway 89.

The Triangle X barn is a one-and-one-half story log building with a rectangular footprint constructed on a stone-pier and log foundation. The first ten log courses, taken from neighbor John Fee's partially-completed homestead cabin, are dovetailed. The six courses composing the half-story are square notched, daubed with cobble-and-cement daubing secured with lath stops. Random-width (6"-12") vertical planks, painted red, clad the gable ends. Unpainted vertical planks also cover the steep gable roof, which features a large hay hood extending beyond the south gable peak. All doors described below are constructed of vertical-planks/interior braces, are trimmed with milled-lumber, and are secured with the original iron hardware. Lath and poles trim the two windows.

The front (south) elevation contains a vertical-plank door, centered in the ground story and flanked to either side by a window opening. The east window is six-light fixed-sash. All glazing has been removed from the west window. A substantial bottom-hinged hay door is centered in the half-story, beneath the hay hood.

Narrative Statement of Significance¹

Ca. 1928, J.C. Turner of the Triangle X dude ranch moved dovetailed logs from neighbor John Fee's partially-completed homestead cabin to the Triangle X ranch where the logs were used to form the first ten courses of Turner's new barn. The barn is a graphic visual representation of divergent notching types; a reminder of the extent to which resources are reused in a frontier economy; and an example of the close connection between vernacular, "pioneer," architecture and its dude-ranch successor. The barn meets the registration requirements for the vernacular architecture property type as defined in the Grand Teton National Park Multiple Property Submission. Because of modifications to the dude-ranch site with which the barn was historically associated, the building is not eligible for listing in the NRHP under criterion A. The barn's period of significance is limited to the year of construction, 1928.

¹ In 1989, the Wyoming State Historic Preservation Office determined that the dude ranch complex retained insufficient physical integrity for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Concurrently, SHPO requested that the barn be reevaluated under a revised vernacular-architecture context.

7. Narrative Description, continued

North elevation features are limited to a double-leaf door centered in the ground story and a half-height side-hinged door centered in the half-story. The upper door is accessed by a milled-lumber ladder nailed to the exterior wall.


There are no features in the east or west elevations. A substantial corral system extends from the south and east elevations of the barn.


Interior

A central aisle, running between the north and south elevation entries, divides the interior of the Triangle X barn. The aisle is flanked to the west by two horse stalls and to the east by a substantial tack room. Exterior walls are log, chinked with split poles. The ceiling is dropped, exposing the log joist and floor planks of the hay-loft floor. Horizontal poles, secured to vertical-pole framing systems, cover the stall and tack room partition walls; the horizontal poles are widely spaced in the stall walls.

There is no interior access to the hay loft. Hay is dropped through a hole in the loft floor to the stalls below.
