Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Brin Building is located in the industrial city of Menasha, on the main corridor of travel between Menasha and Neenah near the southern end of the central business district. Situated on the corner of Main and Tayco Streets, the Brin Building is a two-story brick commercial building from the The configuration is T-plan, Mediterranean Revival period of construction. and the roof combines hipped, flat, and arched forms. The visible roofing materials are red tiles, the walls are brown brick, and the foundations are concrete. The first floor of the front facade consists of seven storefronts On the second floor the defined by flat brick arches with stone springers. balanced fenestration consists of paired windows with double-hung multi-pane sash. A hipped pavillion is the focal point of the front facade and serves as The entrance to the theater has been the entrance to the Brin Theater. Decorative features include a corbelled brick cornice and brick quoins on the hipped pavillion, and a bracketed second floor canopy over the The utilitarian rear elevations are of light-colored Main Street entrance. brick and include emergency exits for the theater and multi-paned casement windows for the second story apartments.

The interior of the building includes an unoccupied basement which once held twelve bowling lanes, soda fountain, and various smaller rooms. The theater portion, also unoccupied, includes a large stage with its asbestos curtain marked BRIN. Some wall decorations still remain. The stores have undergone alterations typical of their age, while the modest apartments on the second floor are largely unaltered. Seats in the main movie/theatre section have been removed also.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Brin Building is historically significant for its contribution to the early 20th century development of Menasha's commercial corridor.

COMMERCE

The Brin Building is historically significant for its contribution to the early 20th century development of Menasha's commercial corridor. Commerce in Menasha originally developed at three different locations: at Appleton and Broad Streets adjacent to the steamboat landing; at Mill and Main Streets adjacent to the waterpower; and at Tayco and Main Streets adjacent to the Butte des Morts Bridge. At first each area served a particular clientele unique to its location. Merchants at Tayco and Main Street specifically catered to the Town of Menasha wheat farmers who crossed the bridge to sell their wheat and purchase goods. After the Civil War the community became increasingly industrial, and commercial specialization declined. Main Street became the principal commercial district with two foci: at the Tayco Street Bridge and at the Mill Street Bridges. Known as Lower and Upper Main Street, the latter was listed on the National Register in 1984.

In the early 20th century, an economic upsurge spurred the construction of five major structures: the Tayco Street Bridge and the Brin Building built in 1928, the Northwest Electrotype and Engraving Offices and Plant built in 1930 (214 Washington Street), the Menasha U. S. Post Office built in 1933 (84 Racine Street), and Verbrick's Gas Station built in 1935 (216 Washington Street). The construction of these buildings extended the commercial district to include Racine and Washington Streets at its respective extremities.

Of these five structures the Brin Building uniquely incorporated retail, residential, recreational and entertainment uses into a single structure. Its was also one of four structures which marked significant commercial growth at the western end of the central business district. These included the Tayco Street Bridge, the Brin Building, Northwest Electrotype and Engraving Offices & Plant, and Verbrick's Gas Station. The latter two were part of a plan by Menasha Woodenware Corporation to develop stave yards into a Tudor Revival commercial district. The plan originally called for stores and theater, which were ultimately included in the Brin.

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The Brin Building was designed in 1928₄by local architect H. D. Werwath and was constructed at a cost of \$140,000. The largest commercial building in the city, the Brin included a bowling alley, several stores, seven apartments, and a 932-seat theater which was Menasha's premiere movie house until 1969.
