Situated near Red Dwl Creek in the open plains of eastern Meade County, South Dakota, the "H O" Ranch Log House is a single-story rectangular pen dwelling measuring 16-feet by 22-feet. Rising directly from a simple log sill, the walls are constructed of hand hewn timbers connected at the corners with inverted "V" notches. Wide interstices are chinked with a mixture of earthen materials, wood fiber, and cement. The house is capped by a broad gable roof supported by a ridge piece and purlins of heavy hewn timbers. The horizontal plank roof surface is covered with tarpaper and native hardpan. A circa-1939 red brick chimney rises from the north gable end. Originally, heating smoke was vented through a stove pipe that pierced the center of the roof. Wall openings include only a single door in the center of the east axial facade and a stock rectangular window in each gable end.

The interior of the single-room dwelling displays bare log walls, a pine board floor, an open ceiling, and exposed beams. There is no loft. In recent years, weight of the roof caused a crack in one of the transverse beams, which has been stabilized with two steel basement jacks. The house is furnished with vintage furniture, an icebox, and a wood-burning cook stove.

Under Criterion A of the National Register Criteria, the "H O" Ranch Log House is significant in the area of Exploration/Settlement, because as one of the first houses erected in the region it has long served a vital domestic function in early ranching operations. It was built in circa 1878 by fur traders along Sulpher Creek about six miles north of its present location. In 1898, the building was moved to a site near Red Owl Creek to serve as a ranch house. The property is an excellent, virtually unaltered example of early ranch housing in the western part of the state. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the following historic contexts: III. Early Commercial Exploration and Military Experience/ A. Fur Trading Posts; and IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement/A. Claim Era.

Dakota Territory was organized in 1861 in the vast lands west of Minnesota. By the end of the decade, the land area of the territory was reduced to just that of the present-day states of North Dakota and South Dakota. Most of the early settlement in Dakota took place in the southeastern corner, but even there development during the first decade was very slow in a large part due to continual fear of Indian attack. In 1868, the region west of the Missouri River was closed to White settlement under terms of the Laramie Treaty, which set up the Great Sioux Reservation in an effort to avoid Indian interference with the then nearly-completed transcontinental railroad. However, rumors of gold in the Black Hills aroused the interest of fortune seekers. In 1874, the U. S. Government dispatched a large, flamboyant force under the command of Lt. George A. Custer to explore the region and to find ways to expel White Col. intruders. Prospectors working for the expedition discovered gold near French Creek, and news of the find spurred a revival of illicit entry. Through negotiations by two successive controversial commissions the government ceded the Black Hills region and opened it for settlement. Yet, central part of the territory remained closed the until subsequent negotiations and enactment of the Dawes Severalty Act of 1887.

Organized in 1889, present-day Meade County is a large tract of land extending some eighty miles east of the foot hills of the Black Hills formation. Much of the land area of Meade County lies in the region secured in the 1887 Dawes Act. By that time, most of the easy placer mining operations in the Black Hills were giving way to serious hard rock ventures. Thus, many unemployed prospectors migrated out of the Hills to homestead on the newly opened plains. Additional homesteaders came from eastern locations. The dry climate best supported grazing; therefore, a substantial ranch economy developed throughout Meade, Butte, Harding, Perkins, Ziebach, and Stanley counties. This region represents some of the last land open for pioneer settlement in South Dakota.

The property nominated here was constructed in circa 1878 by fur traders who were operating in the region before the days of legal settlement. Although this date of operation is very late for the fur trade in South Dakota, it is likely that independent traders used this small log dwelling as a temporary, minor subpost of a larger regional or main post. (See "19th Century South Dakota Trading Posts," National Register of Historic Places, 1988.)

In 1898, the house was purchased by the Holcomb ("H O") Ranch and moved to its present location, where it served as quarters for hands attending winter grazing stock. The "H O" was an immense ranching operation that ran cattle from Rapid Creek (60 miles to the south) to Bismarck, North Dakota. Because this site was well watered, it also became a popular overnight stop during seasonal roundups.

In 1901, Narcisse Narcelle, a successful mixed blood Indian with extensive ranching interests, bought the place. Emanuel Coya, a noted Mexican stockman, served as Narcelle's foreman and resided in the log dwelling. After Narcelle died in a wagon accident in 1912, his sister Louise, who was married to Harry Sturgis, assumed ownership of the house and ranch site.

In 1918, C. A. "Dick" Richardson (father of the present owner) purchased the property. Under this ownership, the house served as a summer haying camp and as a winter feeding camp. Apparently, the wood floor was installed at this time. Local lore contends that during the long winter months the cowboys held many all-night poker games in the tiny log house.

Current owners, Irwin and Inga Richardson, moved into house in 1939 and added the red brick chimney. A year later, they moved to more substantial quarters at a nearby site, but continued to maintain the old log house as a temporary camp. The Richardsons still live in the house when they visit the ranch and keep it in a good state of repair.

The period of significance of the nominated property extends from 1898, when it began its function at its present location as a ranch dwelling to 1940, the established 50-year cut-off date for the National Register. Its significance is derived from its historically distinguished role in the early exploration, settlement, and development of the ranching industry in the region. The property does not need to meet Criteria Consideration B, since it was relocated prior to its period of significance. VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION:

The nominated property is bounded by a set of imaginary lines that intersect to form a rectangle around the rectangular log house. The eastern boundary line lies 10 feet east of the east wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The southern boundary line lies 10 feet south of the south wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The western boundary lines lies 10 feet west of the west wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The northern boundary line lies 10 feet north of the north wall of the house and runs parallel to that wall. The property is located in the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 8, Township 8 North, Range 15 East, (Black Hills Meridian) in Meade County, South Dakota.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION:

The boundaries of the nominated property are set to include only the log house.
