#### DESCRIPTION

The nominated property, Seven Oaks, has been known by this name for over one hundred years because of seven oak trees situated around the home and carriage house. The name Seven Oaks appears above the front porch.

Seven Oaks is a 2½-story Late Queen Anne style house with a modified rectangular plan, an intersecting gable roof, and a The walls are finished with weatherboard on the front porch. first and second stories and wood shingles on the upper half story, and the roof is shingled with cedar. The foundation is fieldstone, and the chimneys are brick. The interior of the house reflects the style in its extensive oak woodwork, ornate original light fixtures, and flowering vine sculptural relief on the living room walls as shown on the photograph submitted with this application. The house is in a residential area with treelined streets. The property occupies the entire North half of the block, and the house sits on the West half of the lot. fronts North onto Audubon Street and is set behind a lawn that slopes slightly to the sidewalk. A garage, originally the carriage house, sits to the Southeast of the house.

The house has had few structural changes since it was constructed in 1893. In the early 1900's, two sun porches were added to the Southeast corner, one on the first floor and one on the second. It appears that these may have been original open porches that were enclosed. Also in the same time frame, a balcony on the Northeast corner of the second story was enclosed and converted to a bathroom. Another change occurred in the late 1950's or early 1960's when the original kitchen, the South portion of the first story, was converted to a small modern kitchen and a small den.

The original carriage house was also changed at some point by the addition of a one story, one car extension to the East. The construction of the carriage house originally echoed that of the house. The interior ceiling is wainscoting and car-siding, the walls are tongue and groove, and the floor is now concrete. The carriage house has suffered extensively from neglect and harsh weather. Repair to the roof, windows, and exterior walls is essential to prevent continuing deterioration of the interior and exterior of the building, and extensive repair to the interior will be necessary. This is considered a contributing building.

The basement of the house is unfinished. There are two entrances, one by stair from the first floor and one walk-out door to the South. There are six areas in the basement. One is the boiler room, complete with the original boiler. A second is a room with a fireplace. A third is a small bathroom. The other three areas seem to be nonspecific in use. There are several foundation-level windows that allow natural light to enter.

The main entrance to the house is through the front porch on the North side. It is a double door entrance, and the space between the doors is floored with marble tile. The floors on the first story are white oak tongue-and-groove with inlaid mahogany and walnut borders in various patters. The walls are plaster, as are the 10 foot ceilings, and white oak is laid across the ceilings in a pattern of continuous squares and rectangles. Two of the windows incorporate stained glass.

The first story consists of an entry, from which the main staircase leads to the second floor, and there are doors to the dining room and living room. The living room occupies the Northwest corner of the house and was created from the two original parlors. The room has a fireplace, and a door that leads to the basement staircase or the den, and a pocket door that leads to the dining room. The dining room has Lincrusta wall covering on the bottom half of the walls, and has a swinging door that leads to the kitchen. The kitchen is flanked to the East by sun porch and to the West by a small den. There are back doors to both the South and to the North on the sun porch. The den has a fireplace, a door that leads to either the living room or the basement stairs, and the maid's staircase that leads to the second story.

The second story consists of a master bedroom and bath, three other bedrooms, a sun porch, and another bathroom. The floors are white oak, and the walls and 9 foot ceilings are plaster.

The third story consists of two bedrooms, a storage room with two quarter round windows, and an unfinished attic with a semi-circle or eyebrow window on both the East and West sides. The floors are pine, and the walls and 9 foot ceilings are plaster.

#### Statement of Significance

Seven Oaks is locally significant under criterion "C" as one of the examples of Queen Anne influenced design in Sac City. There are other Victorian homes in Sac City, but the most notable are of styles other than Queen Anne. J. M. Russell designed the house and Proudfoot & Bird designed the sun porches. Both were noted Iowa architects.

The steeply pitched gable roofs, the tall windows, and the rising chimneys of Seven Oaks carry the eye upward. The spacious interior, with its tall ceilings, is complimented by ornate floors, ceilings, walls, and windows. Both the exterior and interior reflect and typify its architectural style and create its significance.

Over a period of 102 years, Seven Oaks was home to not one, but two of Sac City's more prosperous families. Sac City was platted in 1855, only a year after the first permanent settlers arrived. As the town flourished and grew, businesses were established, and in 1871 the Sac County State Bank opened its doors. In 1886, Eli N. Baily, age 29, arranged to purchase that bank, and later that year he and his wife, Amie, moved to Sac City. Eli's bank prospered, and it remained under his control until his death in 1923.

In 1892, W. J. and Mary Dixon moved to Sac City, and until 1899, W. J. served as Clerk of Court for Sac City. That year, he opened the W. J. Dixon Lumber Company in Sac City, also with yards in Lytton and Nemaha. The lumber company prospered, and was owned and operated by the Dixon family until the 1980's.

Statement of Significance (continued)

It was Eli and Amie Baily that built Seven Oaks in 1893 as their new family home. It was suitable for a prominent banker's residence because of its location and its elegance. The connection between the Baily and Dixon families occurred when Eli and Amie's daughter, Elizabeth, married W. J. and Mary's son, Paul. Elizabeth and Paul lived in Seven Oaks, and the house remained in the family until it was sold in 1990 to settle Elizabeth's estate.

Both the Baily and Dixon families, as well as operating successful businesses, were active in civic and cultural activities in Sac City. For instance, W. J. Dixon served as a member of the City Council of Sac City.

Interestingly, Seven Oaks was the first home in Sac City to have electricity because it had its own generator. In fact, the generator is still in the basement of the house. Appreciating the value of electricity, Eli Baily was one of a group of businessmen that established the first light company in Sac City in 1898.

In December of 1904, the Sac City Chautauqua Association was formed, and the President of the Association was W. J. Dixon. After the Chautauqua building was completed, the Association worked to bring entertainers, educators, and politicians to perform and speak at the facility. Among those who came were Governor A. B. Cummins and William Jennings Bryan. The controversial Senator Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin, was a guest at Seven Oaks during his stay in Sac City.

In January of 1907, a library board convened to plan to build a Carnegie Library in Sac City. The board President in 1909 was W. J. Dixon. Two of the building committee were W. J. Dixon and Eli Baily, and the library was built in 1912. Later members of the board were Mrs. Mary Dixon and Mrs. Elizabeth Dixon.


