This photograph shows the high, rugged landscape of the Bitterroot Mountains of Idaho along the route of the Lolo Trail. The trail passed along the high backbone of the mountain divide between the North Fork of the Clearwater River on the north and the Lochsa River on the south. The crest of the ridge seen in the left center of the picture, and about two miles away, marks the location of the trail in the vicinity of Indian Post Office. This view looks north.
