The old Morse Covered Bridge in Bangor, 212 feet in length, is the longest such structure in Maine and the only covered bridge in the north-eastern United States located within the limits of a city.

Today, through a five-year volunteer project, the old bridge has been saved and preserved and is in use as a pedestrian crossing downstream from its former site. Put to its present use in 1965, the bridge has proven to be a tremendous tourist attraction for bridge "collectors" and children who have never seen one like it before.

The bridge almost met an untimely end when a new bridge was erected to replace it. The covered bridge was moved downstream for use while its successor was being built. It was considered a fire hazard to the new span and the decision was made that it had to be moved again or demolished. At this point, civic minded citizens in the Queen City began to raise necessary funds, aided by contributions from individuals, organizations and the City of Bangor herself. The city now maintains the bridge.

The roof of the bridge is all slate, mostly from London. The blocks of granite in the pier and abutments number more than 300 and weigh two to four tons. Its truss, unique in its use of iron rods for support, was designed by William Howe. (See example on continuation page.) - ?

The Morse Bridge now occupies the central position in Coe Park, a municipal park on both the East and West sides of Kenduskeag Stream in the heart of Bangor.

Structurally, the bridge and abutments are sound. The cover, of boards, clapboards, and trim, are nearly all now restored.

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## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Bangor, the third largest city in Maine, is located on the west side of the Penobscot River at the head of the tide, some 23 miles from Penobscot Bay on the Atlantic. The city is bisected by the Kenduskeag Stream.

The nomination of the Morse Bridge should, in no way, develop an overview of the City of Bangor's place in history. However, the Kenduskeag Stream, itself, played a primary role in the settlement of what became Bangor, as it provided the power sites of a great many water driven saw mills.

Bangor, of the 19th Century, was synonymous with lumber, for in the 1850's, Bangor was the leading lumber port in the world and later second only to Chicago in the 1870's. Throughout the history of Bangor, many bridges have spanned the Kenduskeag Stream, but now the oldest remaining is the Morse Bridge.

Morse Covered Bridge was first erected in 1882. Its truss, unique in its use of iron rods for support, was designed by William Howe, a relative of the inventor of the sewing machine. The span was at one time known as the Bridge of Sighs—sheep were driven through it to the slaughter house, bleating as if they sensed their fate. The bridge once served horses and buggies, the trolly to Kenduskeag and cars and trucks, all of which needed to use it to cross over a portion of Kenduskeag Stream at its initial location by the Old Morse's Mill on Valley Avenue in Bangor.

The present location of the span is said to be near one of the underground tunnels used to help slaves escape during the Civil War era. The Morse Bridge, by its continuing existance, provides an association with the past and the historic scene about the Kenduskeag Stream's section of Bangor.
