SUMMARY

The Horace Duncan House is a two and one-half story residential building located at 202 West Duval Street in downtown Lake City. It is an unusual masonry example of the Queen Anne style with Colonial Revival elements. It contributes to the Historic Resources of Lake City, Florida multiple property group under property type F.1, Historic Residential Buildings of Lake City, 1861-1940.

SETTING

The Horace Duncan House is located on a corner lot at the intersection of West Duval and South Alachua streets. The lot upon which the building is situated measures seventy-five feet in width by 100 feet in length. At the time of its construction, the Duncan House was surrounded by equally impressive Queen Anne and other contemporary style homes. When U.S. Highway 90, which is known as Duval Street in Lake City, was widened in the 1970s, many of the historic homes fronting on that street were razed. The property affected by the widening of the road has since been infilled with commercial buildings, and the Duncan House is presently surrounded by commercial properties on the north, east, and west and residential buildings to the south.

PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

Exterior

The two and one-half-story Duncan House is an example of a transitional Queen Anne style residence with Colonial Revival elements. Its overall massing, with several intersecting units and roof planes, is characteristic of the Queen Anne style. The main unit of the building is topped by a steeply-pitched pyramid roof, which is pierced by two prominent corbelled brick chimneys. Two pedimented gables project from the east slope of the roof. Single offset gables are found on the north and south slopes. All of the gable ends are sheathed with tear-drop pressed metal shingles and contain a single double-hung sash window with 1/1 lights. The building has a red brick exterior, highlighted at the corners by decorative brick quoins. Windows are double-hung sash with 1/1 lights set in rectangular openings with segmental arch lintels and flat sills.

The main (east) elevation of the building consists of three The south bay is crowned by a pedimented gable bays (photo 1). roof and framed by brick quoins. Paired double-hung sash windows with 1/1 lights are located in each story. The center bay features a shed roof extension with a pair of double-hung sash windows on the second story and a double-door entrance with a transom on the lower level (photo 2). The north bay of the facade consists of a three-sided polygonal bay extension with a pedimented gable roof. Single double-hung sash windows pierce the walls on each side of the bay on the first and second stories. A sweeping hip roofed veranda with a central gable roofed projection runs the length of the facade and wraps half way around the north and south sides. The veranda roof is supported by paired turned posts. Decorative scroll brackets support a row of spindle-work, which runs between the posts under the roof. A turned baluster balustrade encircles the porch.

The <u>south and north sides</u> of the house mirror each other and feature an offset pedimented gable extension with a pair of double-hung sash windows in each story (photos 3 and 4). Single windows with corbelled arched lintels and concrete sills flank the extension on either side (photo 5).

The most prominent feature of the <u>rear (west) elevation</u> is a one-story pedimented gable extension that originally served as the kitchen (photo 6). Each side of the extension has a single double-hung sash window.

Interior

The <u>first floor</u> of the Duncan House contains five rooms that presently serve as offices and a bath room. The main entrance of the building leads to a central hall that is flanked by offices. A stairway to the second floor is located on the north wall of the hall and has a decorative wood newel post and a turned baluster balustrade (photo 7). The offices are accessed through french doors with multiple lights. Each of the four offices in the main unit of the house has a fireplace with an elaborate wood mantel and ceramic tile surrounds (photo 8). The ceilings in all rooms exhibit their original wood moldings and decorative pressed tin sheathing (photo 9).

There are four offices and a bathroom located off the central hall of the <u>second floor</u> (photo 10). Each has a fireplace similar to those found on the first floor. The

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original moldings, ceilings, and wood panel wainscoting are intact. The doors that lead to the rooms are topped with transoms. A small storage room that originally served as a balcony porch is located at the east end of the hall. A servants staircase is located off the main hall in the southwest corner of the building (photo 11).

Alterations

The only significant alteration to the original exterior appearance of the Duncan House is the enclosure of the second story balcony to create additional living space. During the 1920s a small one-story apartment was added to the rear of the building off the kitchen. That addition has since been removed, and the door leading to it has been infilled with brick. Although the interior spaces are no longer used for residential purposes, nearly all of the original woodwork and other decorative elements survive.

SUMMARY

The 1907 Horace Duncan House is locally significant under Criterion C as the only surviving example of a masonry Queen Anne style building in Lake City. It contributes to the Historic Resources of Lake City, Florida multiple property group under property type F.1, Historic Residential Buildings of Lake City, 1861-1940 and historic context II, Post-Reconstruction through World War I, 1878-1919.

HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Horace Duncan House was constructed at the height of one of Lake City's most exuberant periods of development. In 1906 Horace Duncan, a prominent local businessman, purchased the north half of block twenty-nine in Lake City's Central Division from H. R. and Florina W. Stoy of Madison County, Florida. The Stoy House was a one-story, frame vernacular building constructed during the early 1890s. During the late 1890s the area surrounding the Stoy House was developed into one of the premier residential sections of the city. With the exception of the lot directly across Alachua Street, which contained the Lake City Second Adventist Church, large two- and two and one-half-story buildings with Victorian designs were erected on all of the lots immediately adjacent to the Stoy property.

Soon after acquiring the property, Duncan had the old Stoy house razed in order to construct a more spacious house, one that blended with the other opulent residences in the area. The design of the Duncan House suggests that it was planned by a trained architect or skilled contractor familiar with the latest architectural styles of the period. Completed in 1907, the house is a rare example of masonry residential construction in Lake City and represents a transition, which was occurring throughout the nation at the time, from the Queen Anne to the Colonial Revival style.

Duncan did not live to see the completion of the house, but his wife, Mary, lived there until 1911 when she sold it to B. F. Brinson. Brinson, a local businessman, owned the house into the 1920s. In the late 1920s the building was converted for use as a funeral home, and a rear one-story concrete block apartment extension was added. The addition has since been removed. During the post-World War II period the building was again used

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for residential purposes and changed hands several times. It was last occupied as a residence by the Herlong family. In the late 1980s a local Burger King franchise purchased the property, intending to construct a restaurant there. Plans for the restaurant proved unfeasible without moving or demolishing the building. Instead, the building was restored to its original appearance and is presently rented to a local attorney as an office.

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Duncan House is at the local level as the only surviving example of a masonry Queen Anne style building in Lake City. The Queen Anne style was the predominant style of choice for large scale residences in Lake City between 1880 and 1910. Numerous examples of the style dotted the major thoroughfares. Since the historic period, however, most of those grand residences have been lost to demolition. The overall massing of the Duncan House is characteristic of the Queen Anne style. It features a steeply-pitched hip roof with several intersecting cross-gable extensions. The large veranda with decorative turned columns, brackets, and spindlework is a feature common to most examples of the style.

Constructed in 1907, the Duncan House also represents a transition from the prevailing styles of the Victorian era to the increasingly popular Colonial Revival. Elements of the Colonial Revival style are the symmetrical facade, pedimented gable ends of the extensions and the decorative brick quoins that define the corners of the building. With the exception of the enclosure of the second story balcony, the Duncan House retains a high degree of its architectural integrity.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

The boundary begins at the southwest corner of the intersection East Duval and South Alachua Street and proceeds as follows:

south 105 feet to the south line of the property, then west approximately 135 feet to the west line of the property, then north to East Duval Street, then east to the point of beginning.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

The boundary includes all of the land that is presently part of the lot upon which the Duncan House sits. Originally, the property contained all of the north half of block 29, which ran between South Alachua and South First streets, in the Central Division of Lake City. The lot has since been subdivided and a non-contributing building now occupies the original western sixty-five feet.



HORACE DUNCAN HOUSE 2ND FLOOR PLAN


