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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hagerstown Armory, erected in 1926, is a two story structure with full basement emulating a Medieval fortification. The structure is brick, with the front block executed in Flemish bond. Attached to the rear of this 2-story main block is a narrower one-story drill hall. A modern one-story brick garage has been added to the rear of the drill hall.

The front (Potomac Street) facade is oriented to the west and consists of two, two-bay wide sections which flank a central block offset by two, three-story towers. In the side sections, windows at first floor level are 4/5 casement with bases set into the stone water table. At second floor level are 4/4 casement windows. All windows have stone sills and flat brick lintels. A line of scalloped stone molding crosses the side sections above the second floor windows. At the roofline six crenelles with stone caps crown each section.

The towers which mark the front entrance to the building are octagonal, with one window in each of their three full sides, 2/5 casement at first and 2/4 casement at second floor levels. Window arches and sills correspond to those of the side sections with the addition of triangular white end stones in the arches. Centered above the second floor windows, in a line corresponding to the scalloped stone molding of the side sections, three square stone panels are set into the tower walls. At the third floor level single 1/1 sash windows are centered in the tower walls with bases set into a stone molding running around the towers. Tower tops are characterized by a ring of scalloped stone molding, surmounted by a ring of brick dentils (r dentils per side of the towers), and topped by two crenelles per side with stone caps.

At center front, three cement steps lead to a segmentally arched entry under which painted metal double doors are recessed 2-3 feet. A stone panel over the arch is inscribed "Maryland National Guard." At second floor level is a 6/4 casement window with stone sill and flat brick arch bracketed with white stones at its corners. A band of scalloped stone trim corresponding to that of the side sections crosses above the window. At the roofline, the stone molding corresponding to the third floor of the towers crosses the center section. The center is topped by two crenelles with stone caps with stone tablet bearing the seal of the State of Maryland centered between them.

The front lawn is bordered by a low hedge.

The north side of the center block contains 3 bays with three 2/3 casement windows at first floor level and three 2/4 casement windows at first floor level and three 2/4 casement windows at second floor level. The scalloped stone molding of the front facade continues around the sides and is surmounted by 8 crenelles with stone caps.

The gable-roofed one story drill hall over full basement is seven bays long, with bays separated by strip buttresses with stone capped set-backs corresponding to the bases and tops of the first floor windows. The basement is faced with stone and contains two 3/2, 6-pane strip windows per bay, except at the second bay to the end where 10 cement stairs with iron pipe railing lead to a double door entry at first floor level. The first floor windows are tall 3/6 sash, one per bay except over the stairs, where there are two smaller windows centered over the doorway. The two sides of the building are identical except that the basement windows have been blocked up on the south side. At the rear of the building is a one story brick garage and fenced motor compound.

The Hagerstown, Maryland Armory is primarily significant for its association with the reorganization and expansion of the National Guard system in the twentieth century. It derives additional significance from its role as a social center for its community, a function it has served continuoulsy since its construction date. Architecturally, the building embodies the distinctive characteristics of its type, including a T shaped plan with a two-story front "head house" section and a one-story perpendicular "drill hall" extending to the rear; its facade is detailed to recall Medieval fortifications, with towers flanking the central entrance, crenellated parapets, and strip buttresses.

The Hagerstown Armory was the home of Company D, 58th Support Battalion, from its construction in 1926 to January 1, 1978 when the Company moved to a new armory building outside of Hagerstown on Route I-70 near Breathedsville. The main reason cited for the relocation was lack of space for vehicle storage and parking at the Potomac Street site.

As part of the 29th Division of Infantry, Hagerstown and Washington County men share in the history of outstanding service by the Division, which was awarded distinguished unit citations and the French Croix de Guerre with Palm for its activities in World War II.

After being vacated by the Guard in 1978, the Armory stood vacant until it was taken over by the U.S. Bureau of the Census for use as a field office through 1980.

A 1977 article in Hagerstown's <u>Maryland Herald</u> describes the use made of the facility's basement firing range as a training center for new police officers. In addition to long-time use by local police, the Armory was the scene of dance marathons in the 1930s and more recently has housed wrestling matches, local school basketball games and annual home builders'show.

In Hagerstown, Washington County, Maryland:

Being the southernmost one hundred (100) feet, of all of that lot or parcel of ground situate and lying on the east side of North Potomac Street, Hagerstown, Washington County, Maryland, and having a frontage of one hundred (100) feet, on said street, and extending back there from with that uniform width a distance of two hundred forty (240) feet more or less, to a public alley, and being all of lot No. 287 and the southern eighteen (18) feet, of lot No. 288 on the General Plan of Hagerstown, Maryland...

Boundary Justification:

The nominated property comprises the total parcel historically associated with the resource.
