#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Francis Tufts House of Farmington, built by the original owner for himself in 1810, is an excellent and well-preserved example of the Federal style in a rural context.

The house is of brick construction(Flemish bond) with a framed half-story.  $2\frac{1}{2}$  stories are present, covered by a gable roof with two internal end chimneys which reflect the center-hall plan typical of the Federal Period in Maine. The cornice is denticulated.

The facade is five bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance consists of a 6-panel single door surmounted by a brick arch. Within the arch is a 5-panel overlight. The door enframement is delicately carved with a tooth-like border, while the wooden lintel below the arch carries an incised diamond plattern.

All fenestration is now 2/2, but would originally have been 9/6 or 6/6, judging by surviving sash in many otherecontemporary Maine dwellings. This is the only alteration to the building's exterior, and Federal style sash could be easily restored.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Architecturally, the Tufts House of 1810 is a finely detailed example of rural brick Federal style design existing  $n^{n}a'$  unaltered state. It is the oldest brick residence of consequence in the region and is further notable for the fact that the bricks were manufactured by the builder, a professional brickmaker among other accomplishments, from clay taken from the banks of the Sandy River a few hundred yards west of the site.

Francis Tufts, born in 1744 in Medford, Massachusetts, came originally to the Farmington area in 1780 from Nobleboro where he had moved with his family in 1775. Prior to the construction of the present house, he had built nearby a frame house in 1791, which, in turn, replaced a log dwelling.

Tufts was one of three men who negotiated the punchase of the township from the Massachusetts General Court in 1790 and became its proprietors. He also built and owned the first mills at Farmington Falls.

A Revolutionary War veteran, he served at Dorchester Heights during the siege of Boston and was a participant in Arnold's Quebec Expedition.

At the age of 87, he left Farmington and rode on horseback to Maineville, Ohio, to be with members of his family who lived in this community founded by Maine emmigrants a few years earlier. He died there in 1833.
