

This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey,





North wing [actually NE] 'built 1780 by Hendrick H. Hopper in area then called "Small lots". Center section erected by son John in early 1800's. The farmhouse was sold to the Hillman family in 1895, ending four generations and 115 years of continuous Hopper ownership.' (BCHS Marker)

The land was owned c. 1767 by "Richard Townley & Co." and part was purchased by Henry (Jan) Hopper about that time. Hendrick was then about 21 and he was the second cousin of Hendrick J. The latter probably died about 1780 and Hendrick H. paid the taxes on the sixty acres until his death at the age of 45 in 1805. His wife Jacomyntie and two sons inherited the property. John H. remained, married Mary Voorhis and raised eleven children here, so he probably built the main section. The house was once owned by a William Holt. In November of 1965 the house was sold to Charles Jacobs by William Nussbaum. (Search by Reginald McMahon for the Bergen County Historical Society)
