Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Powell-Vail House is a one-story wood-frame mid-nineteenth-century vernacular "dogtrot" house that faces north on a partially-wooded rural site about a mile and a half northeast of the village of Pheba in southwestern Clay County. The building is rectangular in massing and roughly symmetrical in plan, with a gable roof having a double pitch on each side. The building now rests upon concrete footings, but was probably supported by large wooden blocks originally.

The plan consists of an open central breezeway (called a "dogtrot") with a large room on either side and a smaller shed room at each of the four corners. All of the rooms open into the central breezeway but there is no interior access between rooms. Between the shed rooms on the north and south elevations are porches that take the form of recessed loggias instead of the full-length porch more typical of dogtrot houses in Mississippi. Each porch has two square wood posts supported by brick pedestals (presumably because the lower ends have rotted away). The pedestals rest directly on the ground, rather than on the porch floor (see photo #1).

The exterior walls are clad in horizontal board siding. Each of the four shed rooms has a small six-over-six double-hung window on its north or south exterior wall, and each of the larger rooms has two six-over-six windows flanking a gable-end chimney. There are also two very small six-pane windows in each gable to provide light to the attic.

Interior walls of the two larger rooms are finished with wide flush boards. The hearths in these rooms have simple mantels made from planks. The interior walls of the secondary rooms are clad in tongue-in-groove boards. All the doors are made of narrow planks nailed to cross-members.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Powell-Vail House is architecturally significant within the context of rural settlement in Clay County because it is a well-preserved example of a variant form of "dogtrot" house that clearly shows the translation of the dogtrot houseform from log to frame construction and also illustrates the way in which the dogtrot houseform could vary in its plan while maintaining the same basic configuration. The Powell-Vail House differs from the more typical dogtrot plan in that it has shed (or cabinet) rooms on all four corners, built beneath the roofline of the front and rear porches, leaving, in effect, a recessed central loggia on the front and rear instead of an open porch. It is not uncommon to find shed rooms on the rear of dogtrot houses in Mississippi, but it is unusual to find them on the front elevation, occupying part of what would normally be a full-length front porch.

The Powell-Vail House is very similar in form to the McNair Plantation House (ca 1835; ca 1850) in Hinds County, listed on the National Register in 1982. Both are one-story wood frame houses, and both have an open central passage (the "dogtrot") with a large room on either side, and smaller shed rooms at either end of the front façade. The McNair House has a rear ell, however, instead of rear shed rooms.


Both of these houses can be contrasted with the Turnage House, another Clay County dogtrot house. The Turnage House, built shortly after the turn of the century, has a much more conventional dogtrot plan, featuring a full-length porch across the front. Instead of shed rooms, it has additional rooms in an ell extending perpendicularly from the rear as does the McNair House.

The importance of the dogtrot house as a vernacular houseform in Clay County is addressed in the cover document for the Clay County MPS.

The Powell-Vail House is believed to have been built not long after the land on which it stands was purchased by Samuel Powell in 1855, when the area was still part of Oktibbeha County. In 1899 the property was purchased by Richard Vail, who resided there with his family for many years. It is now owned by one of his descendants, but is not currently occupied.
