DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Big Spring Union Church, a log building located south of Highway 32 at Springdale, was built in 1795-96 as a frontier church. The structure still serves as a church and retains much of its original integrity.

The grounds have been well maintained with large oak and cypress trees providing shade for the church.

The structure sits on a stone base thus saving the lower logs from rotting. All openings seem to be original except the larger window on the south side which does not have the same proportions as the other smaller windows. The joints at the corners have been covered by  $1 \times 6$  boards apparently added during the 1950's. The boards in the gables have also been added as has the roof although there are no dates for these additions.

The interior is heated by a coal stove located in the center of the church. Neither electricity nor plumbing facilities have been added. Originally the church probably had a hard dirt floor although today it has a hardwood one. The walls have been plastered and painted.

Although there have been these additions and alterations over the years, they have not changed the basic integrity of this frontier church.

Big Spring Union Church is significant not only because it is one of the oldest still functioning churches in Tennessee, but also because it is a fine representation of a frontier church.

The church was constructed during the winter of 1795-96. Apparently a local farmer named Drew Harrell hewed the logs and assisted Rev. Tidence Lane in erecting the building. Rev. Lane was then pastor of Bert Creek Church. The first known pastor of the Big Spring Church was Jesse Dodson who is listed in the 1800 minutes.

History pretty much passed the Springdale area by as settlers no longer used nearby Cumberland Gap to get to the West. The area saw no action during the Civil War although there were Union and Confederate troops in the county. The continued existence of the log church is probably at least in part explained by Springdale not being in the major currents of change over the years.

Today Springdale is still a crossroad town. The log church is now supplemental to a new, larger concrete block church located across the gravel road. The members of the Big Spring Union Church are proud of their log church and it does not seem threatened by destruction.
