DESCRIPTION

The Arcanum Apartments (now the Beldame Apartments) at 1904 Logan Street, in Denver, was designed and built in 1907. The rectangular plan, two-story, flat-roofed, red brick building with a raised basement occupies a prominent northeast corner location at the intersection of Logan Street and East 19th Avenue in Denver's North Capitol Hill neighborhood. The building incorporates a simple version of the Classical Revival style with Colonial Revival influences. Distinctive design elements include pilasters, Corinthian porch columns on the full-width facade porch and balcony, gabled second-story balcony entrance with eave returns and large decorative brackets, classical frieze, pressed metal dentils, modillions and cornice, and wrought iron balconies along the south elevation. The one-over-one windows are vinyl clad replacements that match the design of the wood framed originals. Original window openings remain with their sandstone sills. The interior retains its original central hall configuration, mosaic tile entry, and two staircases. The building has a high degree of physical integrity, particularly on the exterior, enhanced by a recently completed Investment Tax Credit rehabilitation project.

The Arcanum Apartments rises from a concrete foundation. The facade (Logan Street elevation) and south (19th Street) elevation are faced in pressed red brick laid in running bond. Glazed green brick forms the first dozen courses above grade. The rear (east) and north elevations are composed of common red brick laid in English bond. Windows throughout are one-over-one, double-hung, vinyl clad replacements in the original wood window frames. Windows on the west and south elevations have sandstone sills and flat arches. Windows on the east and north elevations have sandstone sills with segmental arches formed of three rowlock courses.

A raised full-width porch with second-story balcony dominates the facade. An 11-step centered sandstone stairway, flanked by stepped brick walls with sandstone coping, accesses the porch which is supported by corner brick piers. The piers rise to form pedestals for the six Corinthian columns which support the porch roof and second-story balcony. Wrought iron balustrades line both the porch and balcony. The full-light metal main entry door is flanked by narrow sidelights and topped by a singlelight transom. A pilaster rises up each side of the entry and terminates at the parapet. Pilasters also frame the ends of the facade in line with the corner porch columns. Each side of the main entry contains a wrought iron grill covered window and metal storm door covered apartment entry. The second-story balcony is accessed by a solid wood door directly above the first-story entry. A gabled shelter with return eves is supported by decorative wood brackets. A pair of windows fills the space on each side of the balcony entry directly above the widows and doors on the first story. A secondary metal cornice runs the full width of the facade and continues around the full length of the south elevation. Three decorative ventilators fill the space above the secondary cornice. A projecting metal cornice with dentils and modillions runs the full width of the facade and wraps around the full length of the south elevation. A sandstone belt course runs over the cornice and above this rises the brick parapet capped by metal copping. Accent is provided by a slightly elevated central parapet section NPS Form 10-900a (Rev. 8/86)

flanked by extensions of the entry bay pilasters. The angled facade corners each contain a single window on each of the three levels and a ventilator above the secondary cornice.

Pilasters divide the south elevation into five bays. Each bay contains a pair of windows at grade. The western-most bay contains two windows on both the first and second stories. The other first-story bays each contain a centered metal storm door opening onto a small wrought iron balcony which is flanked on each side by a single window. This pattern is repeated on the second story.

The east (rear) elevation contains a series of irregularly spaced widows, all one-over-one except for three multi-light casements at grade. One former window opening contains a louvered vent. A metal door provides access to the rear stairwell. Two metal downspouts run down from the roof near each corner to drain the gently sloping tar and gravel roof.

The north elevation fenestration closely resembles the south elevation but the individual apartment doors do not open onto balconies but instead are protected by flush mounted wrought iron railings. A modern round metal furnace flue rises up along the outside of an original square chimney.

The building interior was remodeled in 1974. In 1995 a rehabilitation occurred as part of a Federal Investment Tax Credit project meeting the *Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation*. The original hallway configuration remains as does the original mosaic tile entry, the central and rear stairs, and the central stairwell skylight.

In total, the Arcanum Apartments retains a high degree of integrity and is fully capable of conveying its architectural significance.

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SIGNIFICANCE

The 1907 Arcanum Apartment building is eligible for the National Register under Criterion C for its having been designed by prominent Denver architect Glen Wood Huntington. Huntington designed primarily single-family residences although his best known work is the 1909 Denver Fire Station No. 1, a City of Denver Landmark and National Register listed building. He also designed Denver Fire Station No. 7, a Denver Landmark property, and the 1923 addition to the National Register listed Berkeley School. Denver's Landmark East Seventh Avenue Historic District contains more than thirty G.W. Huntington-designed homes. The Arcanum is one of only two apartment buildings credited to Huntington.

Glen Wood Huntington (1865-1943) was born in Bunker Hill, Illinois, and educated in Waterloo, New York. He originally came to Denver in the late 1870s to work for the First National Bank but in 1880 moved to Texas to became secretary of the Lewis & Wheeler Lumber Co. In 1888 he returned to Denver and opened an architectural practice. Prosperity remained elusive and with the financial crash of 1893 Huntington returned to the Texas Lumber Co. He reopened his Denver practice in 1897 and went on to establish a prolific career lasting until his retirement in 1938. A licensed architect and member of the Colorado A.I.A., Huntington raised two sons who followed him in the profession—Glen H. and Henry Whitney. He died in 1943 and was buried in Denver's Fairmount Cemetery.

Glen W. Huntington derived the majority of his income and fame for his single-family residential designs (see Table 1). He worked in a wide variety of styles from architectural revivals to modern designs popular in the first third of the twentieth century. His design versatility ranged across Classical, Colonial, Tudor and Renaissance revivals, upscale versions of the Foursquare and Bungalow, and includes two of Denver's finest examples of Prairie Style houses.

In the early part of the twentieth century, Denver's previously exclusive enclaves of large single-family homes, particularly the Capitol and North Capitol Hill neighborhoods, began to experience the arrival of apartment houses. The Arcanum Apartments is a good intact representative of the type of apartment buildings being built on North Capitol Hill during the first decade of the twentieth century. These two- and three-story buildings rose on plots subdivided from large houses by owners seeking both a source of income and property tax relief or on lots cleared by demolishing late-nineteenth century homes. These apartment buildings most often were built centered on three or four 25 ft-wide lots, perpendicular to the street, and set back from the sidewalk a distance similar to adjacent houses. Raised basements apartments were common as were the symmetrical plans, long central hallways and raised central front entries.

Huntington designed the Arcanum Apartments in 1907 for Andrew J. Aste in a Classical Revival style with Colonial Revival influences. Architects of early twentieth century Capitol Hill area apartments most often used revival styling to harmonize with the existing stock of single-family residences and to placate some of the neighborhood objections to the negative property value impacts these multi-family residences might foster.

Huntington successfully integrated the 30-unit Arcanum apartment building into a residential area without overpowering adjacent houses. The Classical Revival styling achieved compatibility with neighboring buildings and such design elements as the understated porch and the cut corners on the facade help to further reduce the scale of the building.

The only other apartment building attributed to Huntington (although there most likely are many others not yet identified) dates to the year before the construction of the Arcanum. The IXL Apartments (now the La Bonte), at 1425 Washington, shares virtually an identical plan with the Arcanum. Differences include more elaborate polychromatic brick window surrounds on the IXL, the use of Doric porch columns as opposed to Corinthian on the Arcanum, and variation in the parapet treatment. The IXL includes tan brick corbelling beneath the cornice and stone coping along the parapet with its stepped and pedimented central portion and crenelated facade corners. The Arcanum utilizes a protruding metal cornice with dentils and modillions above which runs a sandstone belt course and brick pediment with metal coping. Accent is provided by a slightly elevated central parapet section flanked by pilasters which rise the full height of the facade on either side of the entry bay. The corner lot location of the Arcanum and the mid-block location of the IXL may also account for some of the stylistic differences. The decorative parapet treatment on the IXL occurs only on the facade and a short way around each side elevation. On the Arcanum, the protruding cornice and decorative parapet treatment extends beyond the facade to run the full length of the 19th Street (south) elevation. Pilasters provide vertical emphasis on the facade and 19th Street elevation. The area below the first-story porch on the IXL is enclosed and faced with brick, now painted tan. Corner brick piers support the wood porch on the Arcanum laving the area below as a sheltered entry to the lowering level apartments. The Arcanum also utilizes a pedimented and bracketed second-floor shelter over the balcony entry and a series of wrought iron balconies along the south elevation, details not found on the IXL.

Both the IXL and the Arcanum exhibit a high degree of integrity. The Arcanum may be in overall better condition due to its recently completed Federal Investment Tax Credit rehabilitation. The Arcanum stands very much as Huntington designed it and represents an important but previously unappreciated aspect of his architectural career.
